

### THE OPPOSITION: APIA LEIGHHARDT

The Wollongong Wolves welcome APIA Leichhardt Tigers to WIN Stadium for today's Round 5 PlayStation NPL NSW Mens 1 match with the Wollongong Wolves. This will be the 46th meeting between the two clubs.

### THE OPPOSITION TODAY - APIA LEICHARDT

The APIA Leichhardt club last achieved honours by winning the Waratah Cup competition in 2013 by defeating Sutherland Sharks 3-0 at Seymour Shaw Park, Miranda. Jason Oswell, Franco Parisi and Sean Symons were the goal scorers. The team was Andrew Bazi, Michael West, Michael Hawrysiuk, Stephen Kayes, Keith Shelvin, Oswell, Parisi, Paul Galimi, David d'Apuzzo, Aaron Clapham and Brad Bartels. Symons, Miraslav Radulovic and Adel El Jamal replaced Hawrysiuk, Shelvin and Pariosi. Coach-Billy McColl.

APIA concluded the previous season (2016) in 9th position earning 26 points from 7 wins, 5 draws and sustaining 10 defeats. 39 goals were scored with 41 being conceded with a -2 goal difference, one of six teams to experience a negative score. Of the 39 goals, Tasuku Sekiya scored the bulk with 11 and ten other players contributed with goals. There were five nil scoring games and three clean sheets. The quickest goal came in the Round 4 Hakoah Sydney City East game and was scored by Sekiya in the 4th minute. Multiple scorers in a single match were Jordan Murray, a hat trick in Round 22 and Sekiya with two braces in Round 4 and 7. Sekiya and Murray scored the first and final goals of the season respectively. The best result sequence without loss was 4 games -Round 19-22, draw, and draw win and win. The worst sequence without winning was 8 - Round 5-12, loss, loss, loss, draw, loss, draw, loss and loss.

In 2017, coach Cummins has added new players that include Fijian international Alvin Singh, Matthew West, Josh Symons and Luke Turnbull plus Matthew West from Mounties Wanderers.

He also has former

Wolves player, Jordan Murray in the midst and he has helped the team to wins with his goals so far.

#### **BLAST FROM THE PAST**

In 1988 in Round 9 the two teams met at Wentworth Park and this game was played on April 4.

APIA-Terry Greedy, Charlie Yankos, Kurt Reynolds, Arno Bertogna, Mark Brown, Lawrie McKinna, Jean-Paul De Marigny, Joe Watson, Peter Tredinnick, Hilton Phillips, and Alex Bundalo. Rale Rasic was the coach.

Wolves: Warwick Young, Mike Hollifield, Jock Morlando, David Ratcliffe, David Skeen, Ray Vlietstra, Danny Crainie, Alan Brazil, Randall Easthorpe and Pat Brodnik.

Before crowd of 1050, the first half was an even affair as neither team could not take their goal scoring opportunities and break the deadlock. The home side finally took the lead when APIA's Alex Bundalo, a former Wolves player goaled in the 74th minute with one of his three 1988 goals. This was Bundalo's third season of seven at the APIA club. However, the Wolves struck an equaliser through Pat Brodnik nine minutes later to score his second goal in successive matches. Neither side could produce a winner so the game concluded 1-1. The coach was John Fleming.

#### THE MATCH-UP

On eleven occasions against APIA the Wolves have failed to score while the away team has nine nil scores to their name. Wollongong and APIA has fifteen victories apiece. The best winning margin has been 5-1 (Wolves) and 4-1 (APIA) with the most number of goals being scored in meetings are six for Apia and five for the Wolves, ironically both came in the one match. The Wolves have scored 61 goals while APIA has ten more. The best result without loss was - APIA five, draw, win, win, win and win (2008-2010), Wolves ten, draw, draw, draw, draw, win, win, draw, win, win and win. (1988-1991/92). In total APIA has 16 victories to

the Wolves' 13.

In 2017 from the four games played, APIA has achieved four victories and has scored twelve goals with seven different scorers while the Wolves have a win and draw with five goals from three different scorers.

The result sequence in the last four games has been - APIA win, win, win and win- Wolves – win loss, draw and loss.

In the previous matches the Wolves bowed to Blacktown City conceding a penalty and a send off in the 74th minute. As the Wolves were searching for an equaliser, Blacktown scored again with one bursting into space on the counter attack to score in the 86th minute. APIA accounted for Bonnyrigg White Eagles by putting four past them with four different goals - Themba Muata-Barlow, Sean Symonds, Joshua Symons and Tasuku Sekiya.

So far this season Murray has netted three goals to be his club's leading scorer while Patrick Antelmi and Yuro Tashiro have two apiece for the Wolves.

Coach Danial Cummins, the former Wolves player who played in the victorious 2008 Championship winning team, will be after the points with APIA to maintain their unbeaten run. The home team, led by coach Jacob Timpano, will want to deny them by inflicting an initial defeat, so this match should be an exciting affair.

### SELECTED REPRESENTATIVE OF BOTH CLUBS - Jordan Murray

Jordan Murray's breakout season was in 2015 for the Wolves and he concluded the season as the leading scorer with 7 in his haul with a total of 2 braces. His first goal came in Round 3 on twenty-seven minutes versus Sutherland Sharks at Seymour Shaw Park, Miranda. The goalkeeper had kept the ball out but could hold it and Murray zoomed in to knock the ball home.

For the Tigers in 2016, he played many games off the bench and equalled his Wolves tally with 7 and with a hat trick in Round 22 against Sutherland thrown in for good measure. Following Brendan Hooper's headed ball down, Murray latched onto the ball to notch the first goal on 51 minutes. Ten minutes forward in time, Murray took advantage after teammate Sekiya zoomed forward in an elusive run, to bring up his brace. On receiving the ball with fifteen minutes left on the clock, Murray turned inside the box and slotted the ball home for his third

To date in this year's competition, Murray opened the year with a brace against Sydney United 58 and followed up the next week with a single strike.

Murray is an elusive striker with a good eye for the goal. He has quick acceleration, deft skill and is difficult to mark.

### WOLVES' PAST PLAYER OF NOTE – ALAN BRAZIL

Scottish International Alan Brazil played at clubs, Ipswich Town, Tottenham Hotspur, Manchester United, Coventry City, and two others before playing with the Wolves in the 1988 season as a guest player. He played a total of 12 games and scored four goals

while here in Wollongong. He was a prolific striker in his career, had quick reactions and acceleration and immaculate skill on the ball achieving honours with Ipswich Town and he scored his initial Wolves' goal in rainy Round 1 game which was also the first one of the season for his club. It came in the 28th minute versus St. George. He was positioned at the far post to meet fellow Scot, Danny Crainie's cross. Brazil rifled the ball home for the first of team three goals. In Round 7 Brazil ran the show against Sydney Olympic at the Sydney Football Stadium. He created gaps in the opposition defence, was faster to the ball and had football. vision. He produced first time passes and scored the only goal of the encounter. Pat Brodnik had sprinted into the penalty area and rounded the custodian lifting the ball to Brazil at the far post. He slotted the ball home from two metres out. Brazil also assisted in the back four by tackling. He was everywhere on the

field making his presence felt in this game. The team ultimately won the 1988 Premiership and Brazil's efforts greatly assisted the team.

Brazil stated in a in a later interview that he came to Australia initially for a holiday but when he pulled on a team shirt he didn't want to be beaten and he had to win. His contract was for three games only but played one in Melbourne at the behest of entrepreneur Harry Michaels who bankrolled his stint. He went back to England only to receive another request to play six more games. He again when back to England and came back once again for a couple of other games. He said he enjoyed his experience in Australia and had an 'absolute' hall'.

Brazil finished his playing career at FC Baden in Switzerland in 1989 and became a football pundit on television amongst other things.

## PORT KEMBLA FC

Officially established in 1966 by newly arrived Italian immigrants, Port Kembla Football Club has held a strong presence in football across the Illawarra for 50 years.

Inspired over coffee at the local Warrawong Coffee Lounge a few years earlier, a team was formed who then challenged the rival Port Kembla Coffee Lounge to a match, where the loser would have to pay for dinner for the victorious team. This rivalry evolved and the two opposing coffee lounges merged to form their own united team "Warrawong Azzurri."

Attempting to join the existing local competition the newly formed team from the coffee lounges application was denied with the Illawarra Soccer Association informing them all available spots were already filled and because they were branded "Azzurri", Soccer Australia would not accept their name as it had too strong an ethnic connotation.

This simply made them more determined. They kept the squad together and renamed the team "Lake Heights United". Another application, followed by additional attempts to join the official competition in 1965 and 1966 were all knocked back. Unperturbed, the intra competition between Warrawong Coffee Lounge and Port Kembla Lounge continued during these disappointments.

And then, fate dealt the boys a lucky hand.

The Secretary of Port Kembla Dunubia, who were facing difficulties, approached the group and asked if they would be interested in taking Dunubia's place in the Illawarra League. They



immediately snapped up the offer, ISA granted them approval and after years of hard work, determination and the famous Italian self belief and passion, Port Kembla Soccer Club came into existence.

Black and White were chosen as the official colours and King George V Oval the home ground. Their first match was against EPT in the Corrimal Knockout Competition. The legend had begun.

The club was formed with a very strong family culture so it was no surprise when they gathered all the young children from around the local area and added the mighty Port Kembla Junior Football Club to the football landscape of the Illawarra.

The senior side quickly made their presence felt and collected their first bit of silverware in 1968, beating Warilla Wanderers 1-0 in the Grand Final to be crowned champions. The struggles and disappointments of the past were all forgotten as the entire community loudly celebrated the achievement of their team. No greater party was ever held in Port Kembla.

The seventies proved a tough time for the club with financial difficulties and uncertainties and instability with home grounds and facilities. The club handled all these challenges and even during this tough period Port Kembla Soccer Club still featured in three grand finals and celebrated loudly again in 1980 when they pulled of the double, winning the League Championship and the Grand Final.



In 1983 the club managed to secure the support of Wollongong Council and local company Brambles, Port Kembla Soccer Club and found a new home base, at Wetherall Park Primbee which still remains their home today. Brambles poured significant resources into the ground but again, it was the local community who ensured the success of the move raising significant amounts of money through a "one dollar gold coin donation" campaign.

1984 proved a watershed year for the club as Port Kembla Soccer Club earned promotion to the "big time" qualifying for inclusion in the Illawarra Premier League for the first time by winning both the League Championship and the Grand Final.

The dreams of the initial Italian migrants, gathered in the Warrawong Coffee Lounge many years before, had been fulfilled. The club had now earned its place among the best the Illawarra had to offer.

On the 31st of March 1985, Wetherall Park was officially opened, and in their first every game in the Illawarra Premier League, in front of a massive home crowd, Port Kembla made the football community sit up and take notice, thumping Bulli 6-1. Welcome to the IPL boys.

Juniors were a strong focus for the club and many progressed through the system and proudly made their debuts with the senior team. The local production line was very strong.

1991 saw the club suffer a big set back, being relegated after a very poor season. Things quickly turned around in 1993 however when



local favourite Adrian Alston took over the coaching duties and in 1994 earned promotion back into the Premier League.

Following this, 1995 proved to be the most



successful year in the club's history. The club won their first League Championship, followed this up by winning the Grand Final 1-0 against Lysaghts and topping off the season by also taking out the Bampton Cup.

A new powerhouse in Illawarra Football had

Success continue to come with the club winning the League Championship in 2001-2003-2004. The club also featured in seven grand final appearances between 1998 and 2004 winning five of these. 4 further Bampton Cups were also added to the trophy cabinet giving fans plenty to cheer about.

Adrian Alston, Harry Sattin and John Fleming guided the side over the ensuing years continuing the development and growth of the club.

2011 saw a significant change with the club renamed Port Kembla Football Club. The club



continues to be at the forefront of football in the Illawarra and has provided many great memories for its bevy of passionate supporters.

The club has come such a long way since a few friends, sat around in a coffee lounge in

Warrawong and thought it would be a good idea to see about getting a game of soccer up and going.

And there is still such a long way to go for one of Illawarra's most successful and respected clubs.





## HALF AND MALF

### FIRST HALF PERFORMANCE VERSUS SECOND HALF PERFORMANCE

(For the purpose of this article, the information contained is solely based on the number of wins, draws and losses plus points accrued.)

With any given season, as teams become fitter as the weeks go by and develop greater teamwork, cohesion and camaraderie, the expectation by most football pundits would be that the second half of a season should be an improvement on the first.

With the Wolves since 1981, this has been justly so in the majority of seasons though there have been quite a number where the inverse is true. In one other season, the performance in both halves of the season was exactly mirrored.

There have been twenty-two occasions where the team's second half performance outdid that season's first half and this occurred initially in the second season, 1982. For the record, the first half of six wins, one draw and 8 losses with 19 points as compared with 10 wins two draws, 3 losses and 32 points certainly provided good improvement in the second stanza.

From 2003/04 to 2008, (five years) was the highest number of successive seasons of second half season supremacy.

In the NSW Premier League since 2004/05, the seasons of 2009 and 2012 had the first half marginally superior. In 2009 in the first half there was one win and one draw for 4 points and the second half produced nil wins and nil points. In 2012, six victories, one draw and 4 losses for 19 points that bettered five wins, nil draws and six defeats and 15 points.

In the three championship years of 1999/2000, 2000/01 and 2008 there were two instances of better second half season performances and one where it was reversed. In 1999/2000, 32 points were accrued from nine wins, and five draws plus two defeats from the first as opposed to 28 points from eight wins, four draws and five losses. Not much difference but a difference none the less. Season 2000/01 was the opposite – the seven wins, five draws and 2 defeats, 26 points in the first half of

the season being bettered by nine victories, two draws and three losses, and 29 points in the last seventeen games.

In the 1998/99 season the statistics for both half of the seasons was identical – four wins, four draws and six defeats with sixteen points being achieved.

Twelve seasons had the first half being superior and the first instance of this was in 1981 the Wolves first year of competition. Four wins were achieved in each period but eight draws to five, three losses to seven and 20 points to 17 was the order of that season

For the season 1995/96 the team achieved twenty points, ten in each half of the season. Three wins, one draw and 13 defeats up against two wins, four draws and nine losses. The season's second half was distinctly improved given that there is one win less, but three more draws and four less defeats.

The best improvement in the second half was by thirteen points with this being accomplished by the teams of 1982, 2004/05 and 2014. In the 1982, the team accrued 19 points from six wins and one draw in the first half while 10 wins and two draws for 32 points. In the first season since the demise of the NSL in 2004/05, two wins and three draws and 9 points was bettered by 22 points from 7 wins and one draw. The 2012 team in the first 11 games achieved nine points while 22 points were garnered from six victories and four draws in Rounds 12-22.

The highest difference of points was 10 for the better first half performances by the team of 1996/97. They achieved 21 points in the first thirteen games and 11 points in the final thirteen games. In 2002/03 16 points were achieved in the first half and seven in the second half.

The first three years of summer football 1998/90, 1990/91 and 1991/92 produced the greatest sequence of the first half season bests. In order 15, 20 and 20 points as against 13, 12 and 17 respectively.


