FROM THE EDITOR

The biggest match of the year has arrived for another season and once again we have two teams determined to write their names in the history books.

History seems to be a major theme of this year's Grand Final as APIA Leichhardt Tigers and Manly United both look to end long Championship droughts.

APIA Leichhardt has already tasted success this season when they won the Premiership for the first time in 30 years.

It was an incredible run to the top of the table during the final six weeks of the competition from the Lambert Park based side.

Today they will be making the club's first appearance in a first grade Grand Final for 14 years, determined to secure a historic league double.

It will be a landmark day for their opponents Manly United as well.

The club from the Northern Beaches have not played in a first grade Grand Final for 22 years when they won their first and only Championship in 1995.

With eight rounds to go in the competition Manly was down and out in sixth spot battling desperately for finals football.

How fast their fortunes have changed.

The club's incredible turnaround has included 10 wins from their past 11 games including a nail biting penalty shootout victory against Rockdale City Suns in last week's preliminary final.

With the departure of Paul Dee on the cusp of the season starting, many wondered how Manly would rebound.

Under the tutelage of Warren Grieve they have become one of the most exciting teams to watch in the competition and stand a great chance of ending the club's silverware drought.

Standing in their way is an APIA Leichhardt side which has broken free of their status as perennial underachievers

Coach Danial Cummins has completely revitalised the team

this season and they are on track for arguably their most successful campaign in the club's history.

I wonder if Cummins would have envisioned such a rapid turn around in form when he took over a struggling team midway through last season.

Obviously whatever he said and did in preseason was the perfect formula to help APIA return to the top of the pile.

Both teams come into the Grand Final boasting two of the competition's strongest squads.

APIA has big name players on all three lines including Tasuku Sekiya, Sean Symons, Josh Symons, David D'Apuzzo and Ivan Necevski.

The fact APIA talisman and silky skilled midfielder Franco Parisi has

struggled to break into the starting team says a lot.

Manly on the other hand are equally stacked with former Hyundai A-League striker Dylan Macallister leading their attack and former Young Socceroo Dejan Pandurevic cutting in from the flanks.

Long time Manly shot stopper Dylan Mitchell has also been in impressive form in recent weeks and set to play a major role.

In my opinion the best thing about this matchup is both teams love to push forward and play attacking football.

It is sure to make for a blockbuster clash and hopefully a Grand Final to remember, no matter who you support.

MATCH PREVIEW

Premiers Sydney FC will take on Sydney United 58 FC in the Grand Final of the PlayStation®4 NPL NSW Men's under 18's competition.

Sydney FC were the dominant force throughout this season, running out clear and convincing Premiers.

They only suffered two defeats all campaign along with two draws, winning the competition by 11 points.

United 58 have had a solid season themselves, finishing in a very respectable third place on the ladder.

Sydney FC Coach Jim Van Weeren has been pleased with how 2017 has progressed for his young side.

"It's been a very successful season so far.

"Results aside, it's been rewarding to see the development of individual players. Some of our players graduated into our under 20's while one even debuted for first grade at only 15 years of age.

"Given we're playing two years up, the boys have adjusted extremely well to the physical challenge."

Going back to results, you can't run away from the impressive season the Sky Blues have had.

"This is a very talented group with

match winners all over the park. They have the ability to create goal scoring opportunities in many different ways."

Having had a week's rest, Sydney FC comes into the weekend's final full of confidence but will treat the big occasion the same as any other game.

"We will keep training as normal this week. They push each other in every session."

Van Weeren wants his players to enjoy the big dance and to learn from the experience.

"Playing in a Grand Final is good experience and hopefully the players have learnt how to manage their thoughts, feelings and emotions leading into the big one."

Sydney FC has beaten their final opponents twice already this season but Van Weeren isn't playing any mind games.

The Sky Blues coach believes his players respect their opponents and will not underestimate them.

"The competition has been very close all year and there are many good teams with Sydney United 58 being one of them.

"Anything can happen in a finals series and that is something we need to be aware of.

"Sydney United 58 are a wellorganised team with an experienced coach who will have them prepared.

"We will have to be at our best to beat them."

That experienced coach in the opposition dugout is Tony Sekulic.

Sekulic took over the squad just before the start of the season in what has been action packed season.

"We have a very young team where most of the boys can play 18's again next season.

"It was a slow start and after seven round we were third last with only four points."

The United 58 coach saw his team's fortunes change against Sunday's opposition.

"After the Sydney FC match we went on a 10-match unbeaten run and rose to third on the table where we finished, defying all expectations."

A heavy defeat to Rockdale in the qualifying final saw Sydney United 58 come up against Manly who they defeated by the odd goal, before again coming up against the Suns and defeating them in a thriller to book their place in Sunday's final.

"We had a depleted squad with under 15's and 16's filling the roster until we had our full squad back before the elimination final game against Manly United."

It was a last minute goal that sent his side through to fight for a spot in the Grand Final where they came from behind to defeat Rockdale and book their spot at the big dance.

"It just showed the grit and determination the boys have been putting in all year."

Being an ex-professional footballer, Sekulic knows what these games mean and is excited for his team ahead of the final.

"I cannot be happier for the boys

ADAM MASSOUD:

SHARKS STAR ON THE RISE

Premiers Sutherland have led the competition from the opening day and if there's anyone that captures the ruthless consistency of Nick Dimovski's side it is the Sharks right fullback Adam Massoud.

The former Bonnyrigg man has been a mainstay at right back in the league's tightest defence and believes the unique team spirit at Sutherland will prove the difference when they meet APIA Leichhardt Tigers on Grand Final day.

"I feel like I've known these boys my whole life and we're looking forward to going into the final as best mates", says Massoud.

"I think our success this season has been due to our team spirit – other teams have great individual players but they lack the chemistry we have, we've done everything together this year and things that other teams wouldn't have done".

The 17-year-old has been labelled Sutherland's most consistent player by coach Nick Dimovski who managed Massoud as a Bonnyrigg youth and says the Sharks right back epitomizes the side's work ethic.

"Adam's defensive duties are second to none, he rarely misses tackles and he gives us a lot going forward.

"That right hand side of Adam Massoud and Jake Borromeo is probably the best right side in the competition."

Massoud has indeed proven an integral attacking instrument for the Premiers this season and APIA will need to marshal the overlapping sprints of the fullback carefully on Grand Final day.

With left back Matthew Stewart galloping forward on the opposite flank the Sharks have utilized both fullbacks to great effect this season and the absence of an out and out goal scorer means the side can produce goals from all over the pitch.

Diminutive playmaker Matias Da Silva Santos leads the Sutherland tally with nine but the likes of the speedy Borromeo and first grade regulars Jack Press and Jeremy Cox will also prove the main danger for the Tigers on the day.

The experience of the Sutherland roster will complement the enthusiasm

of Massoud handily as the full back makes his maiden grand final appearance on Sunday.

Dimovski considers the Sharks flyer as a genuine first grade prospect as he continues his development at Seymour Shaw.

"Adam puts his body on the line week in week out, he's good with managing pain when he's copped knocks throughout the year.

"To play first grade you need to have that sort of physical adaptation because it's such a big step up physically from 20's."

Massoud will no doubt continue to raise the eyebrow of first team coach Grant Lee as the Sharks look to respond from a disappointing 10th place finish in 2017 but for now is focussed on completing what has been a near perfect year for the Sutherland 20s.

"I don't want to rush talk of the first

AEDON KYRA:

HUNGRY TIGER READY TO POUNCE

APIA Leichhardt's Aedon Kyra is targeting two trophies on Sunday as both the Tigers senior teams prepare to take on Sutherland Sharks and Manly United in their respective Grand Finals.

The competition golden boot winner is preparing for his third Grand Final in as many years having made scoring visits to Leichhardt Oval in 2015 and 2016 with Sydney Olympic but says a 2017 championship would be just reward for a club on the rise.

Kyra has netted 18 goals in 25 matches and offered a series of stunning individual performances across the campaign but credits the culture at APIA and relationship across all senior grades as pivotal to the Tigers' success.

"At other clubs getting along with the first grade boys has been a lot harder, but the boys at APIA have been so welcoming and such nice boys.

"They pick you up when we make mistakes and they're always on the sideline supporting us and celebrating with us."

The former Olympic man is yet to make a first grade appearance in the league for Danial Cummins' side but that will surely be a matter of time for Kyra who says he's found his home in the number ten role this campaign.

Having transitioned from an adventurous centre half to midfield linchpin to deadly sharpshooter in season 2017, Kyra now possesses the skill set of a seasoned all-rounder and credits his close friend, former Olympic teammate and fellow attacker Jordan Morfitis for much of his goalscoring exploits.

The partnership was first forged in a heated school football rivalry between Lewisham and Kogarah that saw Kyra and Morfitis lock horns on several occasions.

"We just have a weird connection on the field – if he has the ball I was always expected to receive it", Kyra says. Kyra and Morfitis have accounted for nearly half of APIA's goal tally this campaign and will be equally dangerous on the counter attack as they are in longer spells of possession where the Tigers have excelled this season.

It hasn't all been smooth sailing for APIA Leichhardt though and the Tigers looked likely to spiral out of finals contention after a disastrous 4-0 defeat to Sydney FC in round 17.

That defeat saw NPL veteran coach Michael Urukalo pursue other opportunities and Kyra credits the arrival of ex-Parramatta custodian Franco Cosentino for not only steadying the ship but transforming the Tigers into title contenders.

"Training sessions have changed drastically, with Michael we were doing a lot of repetitive stuff and a lot of running.

"His attitude was that you guys have the ability, you just need the fitness and it will come and he was right. "I've been fortunate to be under two great, experienced coaches this season – Franco is more of a technical coach, he'll change passing drills every session and we do a lot of short sharp movement.

"But I can't say a bad thing about him, we've only lost one game since he came here and he's like one of us, like a young boy and we all look up to him so much."

Cosentino says Kyra is destined for first team football and could easily be the difference when the Tigers take on Sutherland on Sunday.

"Aedon's got really good vision of the game as well as being a good goalscorer but he's worse with his back to goal.

"We've changed it around so he's looking at things and getting into areas we want him to get into.

"I think it's worked for him, he's created a whole lot of chances for us and a whole lot more for himself."

MATCH PREVIEW

Sutherland Sharks are hoping to claim a premiership and championship double when they host APIA Leichhardt Tigers in Sunday's Grand Final at Leichhardt Oval.

Having led the competition outright since round one the Sharks finished the regular season 11 points ahead of second-placed APIA and made minimum fuss in cementing their Grand Final position after beating Sydney FC in last fortnight's major semi-final.

Nick Dimovski's side will enter the encounter as heavy favourites and the Sharks coach says his side are in top condition as Sutherland hone in on their second trophy of the year.

"We're keeping it as normal as possible this week and remain focused on Sunday, our goal from the start of the year has been to win the Grand Final and full energy is going towards making that happen.

"I've been there and done it before so I'm not as nervous as last time, my role is to keep the players calm and make sure they're in a good spot on the day."

The former Bonnyrigg White Eagles technical director led Marconi

Stallions to the 2015 U20s Grand Final where they were defeated 3-2 by Blacktown City, but Dimovski is intent on setting the record straight with Sutherland in 2017.

In keeping with their reputation as Sydney's breeding ground for youth footballers the Sharks will field a hugely proficient side with over 100 games of 2017 first grade experience bolstered throughout the roster.

It's a challenge that APIA Leichhardt Head Coach Franco Cosentino relishes after the Tigers claimed their Grand Final spot with a stunning 2-1 victory over Sydney FC last Saturday.

The former Parramatta FC coach arrived at Lambert Park eight weeks ago following the departure of Michael Urukalo and a heavy 4-0 thrashing at the hands of the Sky Blues but has lifted APIA to their best form of the campaign in his short tenure.

Cosentino says improvements in fitness, defensive structure and work ethic has prevented the Tigers from slipping away and attributes the creation a first grade environment as key to the side's progress during the final third of the campaign.

"The boys have reacted really well, we've changed a few things about

what we expect and what we want to do as a team and they've taken everything on board.

"They respect me and have confidence in me which is a great thing."

The APIA Head Coach acknowledges his side's approach to the match as outsiders but is looking to throw the gauntlet down to the rest of the NPL with both Tigers senior teams in the championship running.

"Sutherland are a great side, Nick will have them well drilled and they're a very flamboyant team going forward.

"We don't mind being the underdogs – I've been an underdog for a long time."

Cosentino has already signed on for the 2018 season and will be administering various technical positions across the Tigers' youth teams.

APIA defeated the Premiers 2-1 in round 14's clash at Lambert Park with Sutherland triumphing 2-0 over the Tigers in round three.

Sydney Olympic won the 2016 20's Grand Final after defeating Manly United on penalties.

MATCH PREVIEW

The biggest game of the PlayStation®4 NPL NSW Men's season has arrived and months of blood, sweat and tears will culminate with what is set to be a blockbuster clash of the titans.

After 22 rounds and three weeks of finals, APIA Leichhardt Tigers will go head to head to decide who will be this season's PlayStation®4 NPL NSW Men's Champions.

APIA Leichhardt Tigers and Manly United have been the form teams of the past 10 weeks and are fitting combatants for this season's decider.

It has been historic seasons for both clubs with Manly United playing in their first Grand Final in 22 years while it is APIA's first in 14 seasons.

The chance to bring home Championship success to their long suffering fans is sure to inspire both sides for this blockbuster matchup.

APIA Leichhardt finally delivered on years of promise by breaking a 30 year premiership drought when they mounted a late season run to snatch the title from competition powerhouse Blacktown City. The Danial Cummins coached side has managed to find a way to win where teams from previous seasons have fallen short.

It is a similar story for their opposition Manly United. Years of falling short at the semi-final stage has come to an end for the club from the Northern Beaches. United has put together an incredible run of results to qualify for the Grand Final after finishing the season in fourth spot.

On the park both teams have squads bristling with talent and neither side possess any glaring weaknesses.

APIA did it at both ends of the field this season as they scored more goals

(50) than anyone and conceded the least (18) in the competition.

Striker Jordan Murray continued his development as one of the best young marksmen in the competition scoring 12 goals in his second season at the club. It has also been a breakthrough campaign for Sean Symons who made the left wing position his own scoring 9 goals and providing countless assists.

Manly United's achievements aren't ones to be scoffed at either. Despite sitting outside the top five with six weeks of the competition to go, the Warren Grieve coached side hit their straps in the run home and was the second best attack in the league with 47 goals.

Boasting one of the strongest squads in the competition, Manly know their way to goal and had five players who scored five or more goals this season.









The game presents a number of key match-ups with some of the competition's most talented players going head to head.

Can Josh Symons and the APIA defence hold out Manly's barnstorming wingers Dejan Pandurevic and Scott Balderson?

Can Manly stop the APIA attack of Murray, Sean Symons and the Mercurial Tasuku Sekiya?


Will the scars from their comprehensive 5-0 loss to APIA prove too much for Manly to overcome, or will it inspire them to greater heights?

Manly United have really unleashed a weapon in their armour and that is the club's right back in Kieren Paull.



"We might be underdogs coming up against APIA but once the whistle goes I don't think that will have much impact on the game at all.

"The Manly United club and the local community have really got behind the team this year so it would mean a lot if we are able to bring home the title."
