We have enjoyed a successful year and have set a very strong platform for some very exciting times to come.

Our first grade team have just missed out on a coveted finals spot this season.

We performed strongly however consistency did let us down at times. THE OPPOSITION:

SYDNEY FC

The newly promoted Sydney FC Youth, coached by Robert Stanton come to Wollongong in 2017 for an initial Mens 1 Premier League encounter following on from the A-League team, which came last year for the FFA Cup. Stanton has been a visitor as a coach in the past with his association with the Sutherland Sharks for some years and will return to the ground he graced many times in his playing days with the Wolves. This will be the third meeting in competition between the two clubs, the second in Mens 1 and the fifth encounter overall.

THE OPPOSITION TODAY - SYDNEY FC

Sydney FC was victorious in the NPL NSW Mens 2 in 2016 winning both the Premiership and the Championship in their maiden appearance in this competition. The team annexed the premiership winning 16, drawing 3 and losing seven and amassing 51 points to finish three points ahead of the second placed team. A big tally of 84 goals was scored with 41 being conceded with a goal difference of plus 43.

In the Grand Final, the team defeated Western City Wanderers 4-1 with Bai Antoniou, Christopher Arditti, Juan Zapata and Charles Lokoli Ngoy netting. Also in the team on this day were Mitchell Evans, Brendan Curtis, Liam McGing, Nicola Kuleski, Daniel Araujo (Capt.), Andreas Agamemnos, and Matthew Green. Emmamuel Gonzalez, Sam McIlhatton and Daniel Maskin came on as substitutes.

Lokoli Ngoy was the top scorer for his club in the Mens 2 league with 27 goals, with Antoniou in third place on 20 goals.

This year coach Stanton has added William Mutch from Blacktown Spartans and John Iredale with midfielder Chris Zuvela, formerly of Sydney United, will be Sydney FC's captain. With the team being young and exuberant, the team has been fit and eager to mix it up with the opposition in the Mens 1 competition and with a victory over the Wolves in a closely fought match earlier in the season, will want to repeat that effort to conclude their season.

However, during this campaign some players e.g. Bai Antoniou and George Timotheou left, with the latter signing for Sydney Olympic.

So far this season, goalkeepers Tim Heward-Belle and Mitchell Evans, together with outfield players Juan Zapata, William Mutch and John Iredale, have been recognised for their deeds in the Mens 1 'Team Of The Week, with some earning more than one appearance.

When English Premier League club, Arsenal FC played Sydney FC in Sydney on the 13th July, Lokoli Ngoy, McGing, Patrick Flottman, Kuleski, Curtis, McIllhatton, Zuvela, Zapata, Green and Agamemnonos all had game time.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

The Wolves played the Sydney FC A-League team in the FFA Cup Round Of 32 on the 10th August 2016 at WIN Stadium.

Sydney FC: Danny Vukovic, Matt Jurman, Sebastian Ryall, Rhyan Grant, Michael Zullo, Brandon O'Neill, Josh Brilliante, Matt Simon, Milos Ninkovic, David Carney, George Blackwood. Alex Wilkinson, Charles Lokoli Ngoy and Bai Antoniou replaced Zullo, Simon, and Blackwood. The coach was Graham Arnold.

Before an official crowd of 8,029, an air of expectation swept over the crowd prior to the start. Was there to be an upset on offer and would the experience of the away team shine through? The Wolves hung in there for the first half and would be tested when McGinn tugged on Carney's shirt to bring him down with Ninkovic stepping up for the ensuing spot kick. Much to his chagrin, Pasfield kept out his attempt and the Wolves gained some confidence from this, keeping Sydney scoreless until the half time whistle blew. With Sydney having the majority of chances, it took the visitors until the sixty-seventh minute before the game breaker came. A Zullo cross found Simon, who rose skyward in between Kawase and Pasfield to project his header into an empty net. Four minutes later. Simon added another. Blackwood had made a good run on the right before splitting the defence with a pass that located Simon to his left. With the outside of his foot his curved shot flew inside the far post, giving Pasfield no chance of stopping. Carney added the third to make sure of the victory. Substitute Antoniou cut back the ball from the by line to Carney. He flicked the ball into the air then drilled a low left footed shot in at the far post. During the match MacDonald's powerful effort struck the far post and this was the closest Wolves' goal attempt.

Post match comments by Zac Mackenzie and Matt Jurman were as follows - Mackenzie - 'we did quite well ... We had a real hot go. Had a few chances, which could have gone in.' Jurman - 'It's a good win for us... We did well. We were in control for the whole game.'

THE MATCH UP

Sydney FC sits in eleventh position with fourteen points from six wins and two draws while scoring

thirty-three goals and conceding forty-six. Conversely, the Wolves have scored and conceded twenty-nine goals and twenty-seven respectively, achieved eleven wins and one draw and being in sixth position.

In each team's previous matches Sydney FC accounted for Bonnyrigg White Eagles 3-1 while the Wolves were defeated by Rockdale City Suns 2-1

The last scorer for each club was John Iredale (SFC) and Patrick Antelmi (WW).

The top scorer for each club at present is Charles Lokoli Ngoy (Sydney FC) and Yuzo Tashiro (Wollongong) with 6 and 10 goals respectively.

SELECTED REPRESENTATIVE OF BOTH CLUBS - ADAM CASEY

Casey played one season for the Wolves back in 2006 and he became the top scorer of that campaign with six league goals to his credit, with a hat trick in Round 4 versus Bankstown City Lions. He played a total of six games in his tenure. His first goal for the Wolves emanated in Round 1 against Sutherland Sharks. Casey took advantage of an errant back pass not reaching the custodian. He zipped in, gained possession of the ball before despatching it into the goal.

He turned out for Sydney FC in 2007/08 to 2009/10 seasons playing thirteen matches and scoring three goals. His initial A-League goal was scored in Round 10 2008, against the Central Coast Mariners at Sydney Football Stadium in the 39th minute. His was the second goal in the 3-3 draw.

Following on from the Wolves he was at A-League team, New Zealand Knights followed by Sydney FC. Casey later played at North Queensland Fury, and a return to the Illawarra region again with Dandaloo FC. Dandenong Thunder FC followed in Victorian Football League in 2012. In addition, he played ten games for APIA and four games with Rockdale City Suns in the NSW Premier League in 2012 and 2013, before with signing with Tuggerong United in Canberra during 2014.

WOLVES PAST PLAYER OF NOTE - ROBERT STANTON

Robert Stanton played for the Wolves for six seasons and scored seven goals at the club. The central defender began his Wolves stint in the 1997/98 NSL season after signing from Marconi Stallions. He made his debut on the 10th October 1997 at WIN Stadium in Round 2 with Brisbane City being the opposition. Alas the team lost 1-0.

His final game was in Wollongong on the 14th March 2003 versus Melbourne Knights. It wasn't the best of send offs as the team succumbed by 2-1. From Wollongong, Stanton went on to play for APIA.

However, Stanton did achieve success however playing in both the Wolves NSL Grand Final winning teams of 2000 and 2001, starting in the Perth game and coming on in the second half as a substitute against South Melbourne. In fact, Stanton was ever present in all thirty-four league games in the first championship year (1999/2000, as well as all finals matches, four to be exact which showed his fitness and his value to the team.

He scored a brace in the 2000/01 season Round 8 match versus Newcastle United at Marathon Stadium in the 28th and 45th minutes. Stanton glided into the penalty area being on hand to connect with an Alvin Ceccoli cross from the left to glide his downward header past the goalkeeper into the net. For his second, he appeared at the far post to rifle home a Matt Horsley cross. In the opening match against South Melbourne in the 1999/00 season, Stanton earned the plaudits with grand display of defending to win the 'Man Of The Match' award.

His final goal was in the 2002/03 Round 20 match at WIN Stadium on the 31st January versus Sydney United. He struck in the 4th minute. He produced a powerfully struck low trajectory shot that flew into the lower corner of the net.

A tally of one hundred and forty-nine league starting appearances with one off the bench was Stanton's Wolves club achievement with seven goals in total being scored.

THE WAY THEY PLAYED

2017 PS4 NATIONAL PREMIER LEAGUE NSW MEN'S

'TEAM OF THE WEEK', 'GOAL OF THE WEEK' & 'SAVE OF THE WEEK.'

These are the performances of Wolves' players who have made the right impressions with their impressive performances to assist the team in specific rounds during the 2017 season.

'TEAM OF THE WEEK'

Round 1 - PATRICK ANTELMI - v Parramatta FC. at Melita Stadium, Chester Hill.

Having his debut for the Wolves, Antelmi made a very strong beginning for his team when he achieved a brace. His first strike was a low hard effort, projected forward as he was practically on the ground after fooling the defence with his dexterity on the ball. His left foot struck sending it powerfully straight into the goal. His second was after he was put through with a defence splitting pass from his teammate Yuzo Tashiro. Antelmi on the right side of goal sped through angling the ball past the custodian.

Antelmi's mobility and speed caused the opposition many problems throughout the match and his goal scoring ability is superb.

(However, due to the club fielding two ineligible players, the result of this match was reversed for Parramatta FC to emerge the winners 3-0, throwing in doubt Antelmi's selection. However, as this was announced before the team's points were deducted, Antelmi's feat should not go unheralded.)

Round 3 - JUSTIN PASFIELD and JOSHUA MACDONALD v Manly United at WIN Stadium, Wollongong

Pasfield made the cut following his sterling performance to keep the hitherto high scoring Manly United to one goal with his acrobatic leaps and saves to safe guard his area.

The impressive MacDonald with his elusiveness and speed on the ball kept the Manly defence honest. He was adept with his set up play and his shots on goal brought the 'keeper into action.

Round 5 - PATRICK ANTELMI v APIA Leichhardt at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

Antelmi scored the winning goal and the only goal of the match when he rose high in the goal area

(with the opposition goalkeeper there trying to put him off but to no avail) to head in a long and high but inch perfect Steve Hayes cross. Antelmi is a mobile player and deadly, if given space, near the goal. Antelmi commented post game - 'it was a massive game for us....today it was a brilliant game for the boys defensively and to get our first clean sheet was good especially against APIA who hadn't lost a game. We are still gelling as a team.'

Round 7 - PETER SIMONOSKI and CHRIS PRICE v Hakoah Sydney City East at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

This game was Simonoski's initial appearance in 2017 after not playing since Round 10 in 2016. He certainly made up his absence with an outstanding display in Round 7. He sent in the corner kick that his teammate Yuzo Kashiro headed home for the first goal. Later he produced a high powerful over the head of the opposition goalkeeper after spying him of his line. Simonoski was thirty metres out from goal and it was a cheeky shot that never looked missing the target as it zoomed in During the play, Simonoski made incisive runs, made assists for his fellow strikers, and got back to defend, even clearing off the line to save a certain goal. The ball was initially kept out but flew across the face of goal before Steve Hayes made doubly sure, also clearing off the line. Simonoski in a post match interview stated -'it was a great team effort. ... It's good to be back...I saw the 'keeper off his line and I thought I would have a go. And it came off..... Yeah, I hope it becomes Goal Of The Week.'

Left overlapping defender and Wolves' captain Price, led by example, making runs wide on the left to support attacks and linked up with his strikers. Late in the first half Simonoski passed inward to Price who subsequently let go with a shot that flew agonizingly wide. He produced another shot on target earlier that was saved. The experienced defender also cut out opposition passes, won the ball in tackles and intervened at crucial times.

Round 8 - JUSTIN PASFIELD and YUZO TASHIRO v Sutherland Sharks at Seymour Shaw Park, Miranda.

Pasfield continued his fine form this season with another outstanding display between the

sticks. He made a number of saves, one where he spread himself well to deny a strikers' attempt. His distribution was spot on and gave his team plenty of confidence.

Tashiro was involved in all three goals for his team and his speed and sublime touch was all he needed to dismantle the Sutherland defence. Darcy Madden's cross eluded two defenders on its way straight to a rampaging Tashiro in the eighth minute. He first timed attempt was side footed past the custodian and his team took an early lead. His second to bring up his brace was from the penalty spot following Nicolas Bernal being wrested to the ground. Tashiro sent his effort in to hit the right-handed post near ground level before rebounding into the goal. Brendan swept in a free kick from the left and Tashiro went for it in a crowded area but the subsequent vision of this incident is in conclusive into who got the final touch.

Round 10 - YUZO TASHIRO and HAYDEN MORTON v Rockdale City Suns at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

Tashiro scored his second brace in this match and his goals were the only ones in the match. Tashiro

is exceptional in the air winning many balls, as he seems to hang in the air to connect. He scored his goal by tucking the ball past a former A League goalkeeper meeting a Josh MacDonald cross in the 46th minute. He added his second in the 81st minute heading on another MacDonald cross. He stated –Today we had a good game. We had good play and I got the goals. Josh Macdonald is a good creative player and he set me up.. We have good moves and everyone helped me.'

Morton was an anchor at the back for the team against strikers who had achieved twenty-three goals so far in the season and his consummate defending stood the test of this match. He read the play well for timely interceptions, whether in the air or on the ground.

ROUND 11 - JOSHUA MACDONALD, PATRICK ANTELMI and DARCY MADDEN v Parramatta FC at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

Macdonald was an ever-present problem to the Parramatta's defence with his jinking runs, trickery and attacking thrusts at the defence. He went close when he tore down the left before veering infield and producing a right-footed shot that shaved the



post and went out. Oh so close!

Madden was a rock in the central defender's position and he impressively anchored the defence. He is very reliable player and can bring the ball out of defence with skill and composure with the ball at his feet.

The striker Antelmi scored with an easy tap in following a kindly provision from teammate Yuzo Tashiro in injury time. Brett Wilson originally had whipped the ball in for Tashiro. Antelmi kept at the defence throughout the match and was the cause of much consternation to them. He showed determination and skill on the ball.

ROUND 13 - PATRICK ANTELMI v Sydney Olympic at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

Goal scorer Antelmi positioned himself in many positions to pepper shots at the Sydney Olympic goal and he did this with regular occurrence. He indeed scored the Wolves second goal in the 28th minute. He displayed cunning in his ball skills flicking balls over the heads of defenders and dribbling past these same defenders.

ROUND 14 - CHRIS PRICE and JAMES MARKOVIC v Manly United at Cromer Park, Cromer.

Goal scorer Markovic began the movement before ultimately snagging his debut goal. He showed enterprise in the build up, linked up well with supporting teammate and displayed his powerful shooting ability by scoring from some distance out from goal. He was impressive in defensive duties with good vision of play, timely interceptions and ability to bring the ball out from the back line.

Left wingback captain Price led by example making forays down the left flank, tackling and winning the ball on most occasions, read the play well, and interceded with anticipation. He showed determination throughout.

ROUND 17 - NICK MONTGOMERY v Sydney United 58 at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

Montgomery was tremendously effective and truly a standout in the midfield for the Wolves as they battled Sydney United 58. The former A-League player was inspirational as he chased down the ball and attackers, having a couple of pops at goal, mounted attacking raids himself and set up his supports for offensive thrusts in the attack.

ROUND 18 - PETER SIMONOSKI v Hakoah Sydney City East at Hensley Athletic Field, Pagewood.

A match winning performance from Simonoski assisted the come from behind victory for his team.

His brace was scored in the sixtieth and seventyninth minutes. Michael Robinson, following a number of passes between James O'Rourke, Steve Hayes, Brendan Griffin and Darcy Madden, set up his second goal. Robinson floated a diagonal high pass to Simonoski on the left side before he subsequently chested the ball down. As the ball fell he pumped it under the diving goalkeeper into the goal. Earlier, Madden had produced a high pass that flew at an approximate 60-degree angle to Simonoski positioned on the goal area line to the left of goal. With two defenders close by, Simonoski reacted quickest to get to the ball. He left these players in his wake then from an acute angle, he rifled the ball in at the top corner to the goalkeeper's left side. Simonoski, besides his goals, was always looking for ways to gain an advantage and did his utmost in achieving this. He was very mobile, looking for space and taking players on.

ROUND 19 - HAYDEN MORTON and PETER SIMONOSKI v Sutherland Sharks at Albert Butler Reserve, Primbee.

Central defender Morton certainly put his body on the line in this match and was most impressive in the back line in assisting his team. Time after time he intercepted passes whether in the air and on the ground with well timed interventions and the two knocks he sustained (inadvertently by team mates actions in the 5th and 75th minutes), did not help his headache. Late in the first half, he cleared off the line to save blushes and a certain goal. Post match he stated - 'yes I've been in the wars today... a bit groggy...as a collective we played well and I am happy with my performance....'

Striker Simonoski was on song again in this encounter, hitting two goals to keep the Wolves in the hunt for a victory. He was extremely mobile in good touch and form, and he led the Sharks a merry dance. He brought up his brace when he received a Steve Hayes perfect pass. Hayes positioned in his own half, produced a long and high pass that caused consternation in the Sharks defence. Simonoski steamed ahead, saw the custodian off his line, let the ball bounce once before subsequently lifting the ball over his head into the empty net. Earlier, after just ten minutes had elapsed, Simonoski got on the end of a Yuzo Tashiro right footed cross from the right to slot home with his first touch with his right foot. With two defenders close by, he squeezed the ball in between the post and the goalkeeper.

ROUND 20 - YUZO TASHIRO v Bonnyrigg White Eagles at Bonnyrigg Sports Field.

As well as scoring the second goal, Tashiro set up the first goal with a delightful downward header falling into the path of Peter Simonoski who then pounced on the ball to subsequently score from close in. Tashiro was exceptional in the air with his headers and he headed in the second goal following a Simonoski corner kick found him in the centre of the six yard area. Tashiro is good at holding the ball up and supplying supports and he is able to skilfully take defences on.

'SAVE OF THE WEEK'

JUSTIN PASFIELD

ROUND 3 - v Manly United at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

Pasfield's agility held him in good stead as he denied Brendan Cholakian curling shot with a dive to his left, using his right hand fingertips to see off the great shot.

ROUND 4 - v Blacktown City at Lily Homes Football Stadium. Seven Hills

Pasfield flew to the right to deflect the ball with his finger tips onto the cross bar following a couple of Blacktown shots following Danny Choi's corner kick. Roberto Speranza's left footed shot was the one kept out.

ROUND 17- v Sydney United 58 at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

A long throw from the left went over the head of a Brendan Griffin and travelled to Panni Nikas who was positioned close to Pasfield's right hand post of the northern goal. The ball bounced then hit Nikas on the chest. As the ball fell to the ground with Griffin and Hayden Morton in attendance, Nikas somehow managed to lash the ball across the face of goal. Nick Olsen gained possession and shot. Pasfield had to move quickly across to his left to the centre of the goal from his position near his right post. He scrambled well, diving to his left to keep the ball from entering the goal and pushing it away with his left hand for a great save. He stated -Yeah it was good for the self esteem....We did well today and the boys stuck in....and a clean sheet at home is what we try to achieve.'

'GOAL OF THE WEEK'

ROUND 3 - YURO TASHIRO (Nomination) at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

Japanese striker Tashiro scored in the 50th minute after he linked up with Joshua MacDonald who took the ball across the field played a one- two pass with Peter Simonoski before passing to Tashiro. From

the left of the goal Tashiro left fly and the ball flew in the right side of the goal.

ROUND 11 - PATRICK ANTELMI (Winner) at Lambert Park, Leichhardt.

Against Sydney FC, Antelmi scored his team's only goal of the match and what a stunner it was. Joshua MacDonald swung a corner kick high in and it went to the far post. The Sky Blues central defender Patrick Flottman headed the ball out to the right of the goalkeeper's left goal. It subsequently bounced in front of Antelmi who was facing the sideline. He kept under pressure from George Timotheu who was behind him. Antelmi produced a spectacular overhead kick that caught Sydney FC Youth by surprise as the ball lodged inside the far post. This was certainly a worthy winner of 'Goal Of The Week'.

ROUND 14 - JAMES MARKOVIC (Winner) at Cromer Park. Cromer.

Markovic scored his debut goal for the Wolves in the Round 14 Manly encounter. The Manly goalkeeper's goalkeeper pumped the ball forward and a teammate near the halfway mark heeded it onwards. Markovic gained possession on his team's side of halfway. He ventured forward linking up with Brendan Griffin on his right. Griffin shrugged off an attempted tackle, before returning the ball to Markovic who had run further forward. Markovic burst between two defenders then burying his left footed drive from twenty-five metres out inside the far post with the custodian comprehensibly beaten.

ROUND 16 - PETER SIMONOSKI (Duel Winner) at WIN Stadium, Wollongong.

Simonoski scored the only goal for his team versus Blacktown City and what a doozey it was. He charged down Connor Evans attempted clearance on the left and fortuitously gained possession from the floored opponent. Simonoski completed a couple of touches and moved inward, bamboozling another defender with a feign and dribble. Positioned just inside the penalty area, he let fly with his right foot. The ball swung in the air to lodge narrowly inside the far post for a tremendous goal.



END OF THE LINE

FINAL ROUND OF A SEASON

As the 2017 final round is upon us with today's match against Sydney FC Youth, it is pertinent to look back at some of the encounters that have been played in the years gone by. To date, in thirty-six seasons of the Wollongong Wolves there have been fifteen victories, ten draws and eleven defeats in the final league round, in percentages, 41.6% wins, 27.9% draws and 30.5% defeats.

Several clubs have been our adversaries on these occasions with APIA Leichardt topping the bill with four, followed by Newcastle, Sutherland Sharks and Sydney Olympic with three apiece. In the NSW based competition from 2004/2005, there have been twelve matches played with six wins (50%), three losses (25%) and three draws (25%) being the breakdown. Varying results have occurred such as a 6-5 loss, 5-0 and 5-1 wins and two 1-1 draws.

Over all seasons, the worst result has been a 4-0 loss to Sydney Olympic in 1994/95 with the best being a 6-0 rout against Manly in 1987.

Following are five of these final round matches at the 'end of the line' in seasons past, with three from the NSW Premier League and two from the National Soccer League. Some of these matches may rekindle memories.

2013

Tension was high in the air at Macedonia Park (Hooka Creek) when the Central Coast Mariners Academy came to Berkeley for the relegation battle in Round 22. The home team was behind in the club championship and the opponents were ahead with the home team needing wins in all three grades. With the U18s and U20s doing their part winning 2-1 and 4-2 respectively, it was up the firsts team to not disappoint.

The home team was Daniel Collison (GK), Jack Keating, Mathew Kocic, Sam Chapple, Chris Nathaniel, Zac MacKenzie, Steve Hayes, Ricky Zucco, Mitchell Del Turco, Jacob Timpano (Capt.), Peter Simonoski. Josh Bingham replaced Del Turco. The coach was Richard Lloyd.

It was eight minutes in when Simonoski goaled following an error by a defender who misjudged his attempted clearance. Simonoski gained possession and produced a right-footed shot. The ball flew into the goal between the custodian and the far post. Tension was thus relieved for a time.

Just shy of the half hour mark, the Mariners restored parity through an unlikely source. A corner kick was flighted in and the ball went into the goal off Zucco in a crowded area.

The Mariners hit the lead eight minutes after the own goal and this was a worrying time. It was lobbed in and went over Collison's head and this 2-1 lead was carried into the half time break.

A handball in the box was a lifesaver for the Wolves twelve minutes after the second half restart. During the season the Wolves had a many penalties against them and this was a rare positive decision for the club. Zucco made amends by powering his spot kick to the left of centre, as the goalkeeper dived the opposite way. Further efforts by Hayes (a header) Simonoski, Zucco and Mackenzie failed to get the desired victory. Collison pulled off a crucial save in injury time added on to deny the Mariners a winner. However a draw was enough together with a superior goal difference, with this being enough to keep the club afloat in the Premier League. The result in this match was the second draw in successive matches.

Coach Lloyd stated post match - 'we got there in the end and we probably had the better of the chances in the second half and were unable to put those away. And ironically it was

a penalty that got us back, after everything... Zucco scored the first goal for them and he made up for that....Hayes is always top shelf, a top bloke and a top player. He leads and they follow. I'm sure he travels about 12-13 kms a game.'

Captain Timpano - 'we got them after they were nine points ahead and the U18s and U20s were super today. And we had two options - either a win or a draw. And we were buzzing in the club championship today. It has been a tough year and all the boys were magic today....'

Hayes - 'the fight was always there and I'm so proud of the boys, they put the hearts on their sleeves. But although we did not win, we kept the club alive and that was the whole aim. The mentality of the lads all week was good to fight.... I had a header but I could not see the ball and it actually hit me on the head. I had no idea where it was because of the sun'...

Chapple - 'we got the result we wanted so that's the most important thing. It was a tough game but we fought well. It was a bit of a slow start but we got the result and happy days.'

2011

This Seymour Shaw match was Round 22 and two current (2017) Wolves players in Chris Price and Hayden Morton as well as a former clubman in Matthew Bailey, played for the Sharks. It was on the 28th August 2011.

The Wolves team was Brody Crane (GK), Jack Keating, Dave Abel, Jacob Timpano, Nick Littler, Stepjan Paric, Zac Freeburn, Andres Gomez, Mark Picciolini, John Martinoski and Sean Robertson. Sasho Petrovski, Cameron Littler and Chris Nathaniel replaced Picciolini, Martinoski and Robertson. Trevor Morgan was the coach.

The Wolves got off to an early advantage when Robertson goaled after just four minutes had

elapsed. He had broken through the defensive line with only the custodian to beat. He subsequently came off his line and Robertson shot. The ball cannoned off the 'keeper before Robertson strode past a defender and regained, before poking the ball into the goal.

Central defender Abel made a searching forward run on forty-one minutes that culminated in a corner kick. Paric's ensuing effort was flighted to the far post and Nick Littler was there to rise high to head home.

Custodian Crane made a number of crucial saves with his fingertips denying Bailey, and Panni Nikas while shots Petrovski, Picciolini, Martinoski and Gomez flew in they did not hit the target nor earn the plaudits.

Coach Morgan -...'Sutherland was not at full strength but we did enough to win.'



Nick Littler, who played impressively stated - 'it was very satisfying, getting the win, a goal and a clean sheet.'

2006

This match was played away at Belmore Oval and Sydney Olympic was the opposition. It was 3 pm kick off on 25th June 2006, and the Wolves team consisted of Stacy Alogdellis (Gk), David Polidoro, Karouna Michael, Chris Rigopoulos, Ian Waldon, Dean Kerr, Ballamodou Conde, Steve Hayes, Dustin Wells, Samet Kaynak and Wayne Gibson. James Young came on for Kaynak and this was his only appearance for the firsts team. John Turner was the coach.

Hayes provided the pass for Wells to race onto and being one on one with goalkeeper he won out by scoring in the forty-ninth minute. This was the first goal after two previous home games produced nil score results for the club. In turn Wells turned provider for Hayes, producing a squared pass for the energetic midfielder to slot into the goal on sixty-one minutes.

Sydney Olympic had dominated a lot of the match and was positioned in the Wolves' half for long periods but could not goal until late in the match. It was virtually the last throw of the dice when a rebounded shot was put in. This Wolves victory came following three successive defeats to end the season on a relative high.

1995/96

This final game was Round 33 played at Brandon Park on 28th April 1996 with a crowd of 3298 being in attendance with Melbourne Knights being the adversary.

Coached by Nick Theodorakopoulos, the Wolves team consisted of Brett Hughes (GK), Martin Bourke, Matthew Horsley, Lupcho Naumovski, Sasho Dimoski, Richard Lloyd, Tony Perenich, Alvin Ceccoli, Matthew Dihm, Mario Jermen, and Ian Pollari. Mineo Bonetig came on for Dimoski.

Jermen scored in 8th minute and Melbourne Knights' two goals were scored brothers Cervinski, Adrian in the 37th minute and David in the 80th, each of whom played for the Wolves, one in the past and one in the future. Jermen was equal top scorer for the club and the goal in this match was his ninth of the season. This loss came after a previous round victory.

1989/90

This Round 26 game was played on Wednesday 25th April at Brandon Park. For this encounter with Sunshine George Cross from Melbourne the team selected was George Bouhoutsos (GK), Jock Morlando, David Ratcliffe, David Skeen, Zivko Hristovski, Jerry Murphy, Paul McFadden, Declan McEvoy, Danny Crainie, Randall Easthorpe and Pat Brodnik. Jeff Allport and Danny Petkovic came on as substitutes. Ratcliffe was in his first season as player/coach.

Before a crowd of 1049, the Wolves went into the lead in the thirty-sixth minute with defender Skeen netting. This was Skeen's fourth season and third goal with the club. There were no further goals in this period and the 1-0 score line remained at half time break. Substitute Petkovic came on to score his one and only goal for the club eight minutes into the second half. Easthorpe, the club's top scorer in the previous 1989 season, duly goaled on seventy-one minutes. To top off the match, Skeen achieved his brace six minutes following Easthorpe's goal. This final round 4-0 victory eventuated following four losses in the previous four matches, shipping a total of fourteen goals with nil in reply in the process. Included in the Sunshine line-up were Craig Foster and Ernie Tapai.

Last season (2016) it was a loss to Bonnyrigg White Eagles by two goals to nil. How will the 2017 squad complete the 'end of the line' final league match today?

If you don't believe in miracles, watch the highlights from Manly United's incredible 3-2-comeback victory against Sydney United 58 on Sunday afternoon.

A victory that not only ensures Manly's qualification for this year's finals, but also brings an end to the top five ambitions of Mark Rudan's team.

Erratic at best in recent weeks, with a deserved win over Blacktown City followed up with a crushing 5-0 defeat at the hands of APIA Leichhardt Tigers, Manly United will be hoping to head into their do or die finals match against either Sydney Olympic of Wollongong Wolves full of confidence.

With Dejan Pandurevic firing on all cylinders and the experienced head of Dylan Macallister leading the line, Manly will be tricky customers in the finals series and could make a run all the way to the Grand Final if they produce their best football.

5. SYDNEY OLYMPIC FC

Best Finish: 4th Worst Finish: 6th
