Newly crowned 2018 Waratah Cup Champions and 2017 Premiers and Grand Finalists APIA Leichhardt are the Wollongong Wolves opposition in today's Round

19 match at WIN Stadium for the 47th meeting in league matches since the first in 1981 which concluded in a 1-1 draw on the 5th April with Peter Tredinnick (WW) and Zdenko Kafka (A) being the scorers. APIA is the leading team in the 2018 competition after scoring six goals versus Sutherland Sharks in Round 17.

## THE OPPOSITION TODAY – APIA LEICHHARDT

A new coach for 2018 is returnee Billy McColl who has taken over from last year's successful gaffer, Danial Cummins. New recruits for APIA for this 2018 competition include Howard Fondyke (Parramatta FC) Zach Mackenzie (Bonnyrigg White Eagles), Lachlan Roberts and George Howard (Melbourne Victory). However, In the middle of the year transfer Mackenzie departed for Sydney Olympic.

APIA Leichhardt since its inception in 1954 last won honours by annexing the NPL NSW Mens1 Premiership in 2017 when the team drew with Rockdale City Suns in Round 22 to tally forty nine points from sixteen wins and one draw, two points ahead of the second team. This was the club's first premiership since winning thirty years ago in 1987 when the club took out the NSL Premiership with thirty-five points. Coached by Danial Cummins, players who turned out for APIA during 2017 were Ivan Necevski, Nathan Millgate, Josh Symons, Sean Symonds, Franco Parisi, Corey Biczo, Jordan Murray, Matthew West, David D'Apuzzo, Sean O'Connell, Adrian Vlastica, Brandon Lundy, Tasuku Sekiya, Dominic Cox, Adrian Uchino, Themba Muata-Marlow, Bradley Bartels, Luke Turnbull and Paul Galimi.

In the last four years, the Lambert Park club has finished in 11th, 2nd, 8th and 1st, on the point's table, which has been a bit of a rollercoaster ride with little consistency. However, the club has reached the summit and no doubt will want to stay in these high echelons in future and is successful at this stage of the 2018 competition. Danial Cummins had certainly done a great job in the coaching role to gain his club's first

premiership since 1987.

Last season Jordan Murray was the top scorer with ten goals with ten other players were also on the goal scorers list plus an own goal. The team achieved 49 points from 16 wins and one draw, scoring and conceding 50 and 18 goals with a goal difference of plus 32, the best in the competition. APIA was kept scoreless on two occasions, which was the best together with one other team. The best result sequence without loss was five matches, Rounds 10-14 win, win, win, win and win and Rounds 18-22, win, win, win, win and draw. D'Apuzzo scored the quickest goal, which was achieved in the third minute of the Round 19 Sydney Olympic game. 6-0 was the highest scoring match over Parramatta FC in Round 18 while 4-2 was the worst defeat. A multi scorer in a single match was Murray, with a hat trick (one of only three in the competition) and brace in addition with a brace by Uchino. The team's goal scoring per games average was 2.27 while the converse was 0.81.

Fourteen players were included in the 2017 'Team Of The Week' with S. Symonds gaining the most nominations i.e. seven. This was followed by Sekiya (5), Murray (3), Biczo (3), Millgate (2), D'Apuzzo (1), Galimi (1), Lundy (1), Muata-Marlow (1), Necevski (1), Parisi (1), J Symons (1), Turnbull (1), and Uchino (1).

In addition, Sean Symons was named the NPL NSW Mens 1'Player Of The Year' for 2017 and Danial Cummins achieved the 'Coach Of The Year' award. Symons and Sekiya (as a substitute) were named in the 'Team Of The Year.'

APIA had a good run in the 2017 FFA Cup going out in the Round of 16 to Blacktown City. In addition, the team played in the National Premier League Finals series winning the first match against Adelaide City 1-0 with Sekiya scoring before bowing out in the semi finals 2-1 to Heidelberg United, Biczo scoring his team's goal.

## THE MATCH-UP

Since 2004/05 in the NSW competition, the two teams have met 25 times with APIA leading by two with 11 wins and being ahead in the scoring department, 45 goals to 36. APIA's best win is 3-0 in 2006 while the Wolves biggest victory is 5-1 in 2014. The Wolves have five nil scores to



APIA's three with the highest number of goals scored in a single match being 11, in the 6-5 score line in 2009.

In 2018, the last five matches have produced this sequence - APIA - loss, win, win, win and win, Wolves - draw, win, win, loss and loss. The current position in the standings is first and eighth. The previous rounds result saw APIA defeating Sutherland Shark 6-2 and the Wolves being defeated by Bonnyrigg White Eagles 1-0.

The scorers of the team's previous league goals coming into this match were Sekiya and Yuzo Tashiro. APIA has had twelve contributors to the team's goal tally whereas the Wolves have eight. Jordan Murray and Peter Simonoski are each teams top scorers with eighteen and seven in total respectively.

This will be a tough assignment for the home side while the in form away team will fancy their chances.

#### PLAYERS TO WATCH

APIA striker Jordan Murray is a talented goal poacher to keep an eye on having scoring more goals in this season than in 2017. He has also been a multi scorer on five occasions this

season, two hat tricks and four braces and also the top scorer in the competition to date, so he will be eager to put on a show and get on the score card against his former team. He also scored a brace when his team was victorious in the Waratah Cup Final in the previous week and he also won the 'Man Of The Match' award.

Wolves' goalkeeper Justin Pasfield has been the guardian of the goal and he will be set for the challenge from the much-vaunted APIA strike force. His actions between the sticks have greatly assisted the team consistently for a number of seasons now and his work ethic is second to none.

#### BLAST FROM THE PAST

In 2012, the teams met at John Crehan Park in Round 10. The line-ups were -

Wolves - Daniel Collison, Jacob Timpano, Michael Robinson, Samuel Jacob, Nick Littler, Chris Nathaniel, Mark Picciolini, Sasho Petrovski, Peter Simonoski, and Sean Robertson. John Martinoski Fabian Iacovelli and Cameron Littler subbed on for Littler, Simonoski and Robertson.

APIA - Anthony Costa, Adel El Jamal, Mun-Soo Gil, Ethan Galbraith, Michael West, Danial



Cummins, Stephen Kayes, Adam D'Apuzzo, Andy Bevin, Adam Casey, Brad Bartels and Sam Salameh. Wandí Jajaw subbed on for Bevin.

APIA shocked the home team by scoring in the third minute. Cummins headed down a corner kick that in the muddy conditions rolled along the line eluding a defender before going into the goal. Casey and Bevin were mobile with their runs keeping the Wolves' defence on their toes. Early in the second half APIA increased their lead. An incisive through pass found Casey. He sliced through eluding Timpano before tucking the ball past Collison. APIA looked home and hosed.

However, the Wolves clawed back one in the 70th minute with Petrovski goaling. Picciolini's penalty kick was kept out by Costa but not held. Following through the ace striker Petrovski placed the ball out of reach of Costa to reduce the arrears. Two minutes later, Picciolini made up for his penalty miss by latching onto Nathaniel's cross and thundering the ball home. In the 80th minute, Petrovski made a marauding incursion down the sideline. Eluding a persistent Bartels he managed a cross field pass to the far side for Cameron Littler. Subsequently, he provided a pass for Simonoski who took a touch before powering the ball into the back of the

net. APIA received a penalty kick following the impudence of Bevin. He got up to take the kick. Collison was able to save but not hold the ball and APIA could not take advantage. The Wolves had escaped with a win. Petrovski stated -'It was an unbelievable effort. It was a bit hard to take (the first half). We were on the receiving end.... We had to dig deep to get out of it.' Simonoski -'I'm glad it went in. I thought about hitting it first time but then decided to take a touch then hit it.... Daniel saved the penalty. It was great result.' An injured Cummins stated - 'It was disappointing to be up by two goals and lose.'

### APIA PAST PLAYER OF NOTE - PETER WILSON

Uncompromising and tough tackling central defender Wilson played four seasons with the Lambert Park club from 1979 to 1982 amassing eighty-five games with one goal credited that eventuated in 1981. The English born Wilson scored in the Round 16 on the 7th June scoring the first of his team's two goals in the eighty-fifth minute at APIA's home ground. He became a club captain/coach and retired from football in 1982 following a dispute. He played sixty-five full international appearances for his country with three goals and was the Socceroo captain that led the Australia team at the 1974 World Cup. Other clubs he played for in Australia were South Coast United, Marconi and Western Suburbs. He currently resides in Wollongong.

### SELECTED REPRESENTATIVE OF BOTH CLUBS - ARNO BERTOIGNA

Bertogna played in the Wolves first season in 1981 coming in part way during the season and made fifteen appearances. He was also there in 1982 playing twenty-nine times. He was a no nonsense defender, strong in the tackle and comfortable on the ball. He was on the scoresheet on one occasion coming in thirteenth minute Round 10 clash with St. George at the Wollongong Showground in 1982 on the 18th April. He played up front for some matches as distinct from his usual position in defence.

He went on to play six seasons with the Tigers from 1983 - 1988. With nine goals to his credit, it was a good haul for a defender.

### WOLVES' PAST PLAYER OF NOTE - LEE ADAM

Adam was an English born midfielder from Leicester who played for the club for two seasons from 1981, scoring eight goals, with most of these emanating from the penalty spot, the first of which came in Round 4 1981 versus St. George at the Wollongong Showground. He made 29 appearances in 1981 with four goals to his credit and 28 in his second year, with another four goals. Against Marconi in 1981 Adam hit a goal from thirty metres out. It flew into the goal, for this one of his non-penalty goals. Adam's final league game for the Wolves was on 5th September 1982 at Wollongong Showground versus Brisbane City. His final game of all was in the Preliminary Final against St. George (and the ultimate Grand final winners)

on 26th September 1982 at the Wollongong Showground.

Adam came to the Wolves from the Western Australian club Kiev (now Inglewood United) and was previously with Derby County in England, before returning to Kiev once his Wolves stint was completed.

At the Wolves, he was an industrious midfielder, composed in what he did, read the play well and possessed a powerful right-footed shot, scoring his fair share of goals from the penalty spot.

## PORT KEMBLA FOOTBALL CLUB



Port Kembla Football Club stalwart, Albano Cazzolli came to Australia from his home near Lake Garda in Italy as a teenager in 1962. As many migrants of the time he started working at the local steel works in Port Kembla soon after arriving in the area.

For new immigrants to Australia, the focal point for social life after work was the local coffee shop and for Albano, his was the Marina Coffee Lounge in Warrawong. Here he gathered with other newly arrive migrants forging friendships and settling into this new life in his new, adopted country.

Port Kembla Football Club emerged from the Italian immigrant community in the Port Kembla/Warrawong area in the mid 1960s, when two coffee shop teams decided their best players were good enough to play at a competitive level in the local competition. The love of football was something the migrants brought with them to Australia.

Albano Cazzolli commenced his involvement with the club as a player in the team back in those early days, and is still an active and contributing volunteer today, assisting in ground & amenities maintenance, canteen facilities and has attended every single home game some 60 years later.

Now that is dedication and passion.

From his time from starting as a player in the 60's, to his current volunteer role; Albano has



fulfilled numerous roles and positions within the Port Kembla Football Club committee, including Club President, and his commitment and efforts for the club has seen him become a Life Member of Port Kembla Football Club. An acknowledgement of the tireless work he has undertaken to help grow Port Kembla Football Club to the mighty club it is today.

Albano was also at the forefront of Port Kembla Football's club relocation from the ground at Coomaditchie to the current facilities at Wetherall Park.

Initially the Wetherall Park site was simply a barren piece of land, however thanks to Albano and many other like minded volunteers and friends, everyone worked together, contributed





and built the land up to produce the ground that Port Kembla Football Club proudly play at today. Community commitment at its finest.

Port Kembla Football Club has become one of the most successful clubs in the Illawarra Premier League history. The success of the club is in no small part to the dedication and service of Albano Cazzoli and the forefathers of the club who have worked alongside him.

Congratulations to Albano for decades of contribution to football across our region and in particular for all his devotion and love of Port Kembla Football Club. It is through the commitment of Albano and many others like him that football across our region continues to grow and flourish.

The players with the highest number of goals are 'slicker than most' and there are five players who have scored four or more goals in a single league match for the Wolves. The highest number was six with this record having been equalled but never surpassed. Five was the next best with four goals having been hit as the next best haul with four players sharing this distinction with one achieving this on two occasions. It was in 1988 for the first of these hauls in the National Soccer League with the last and only one emanating in the 2004/05 NSW Premier League. Three of these players went on to be the club's top scorer in the same season.

## SIX - PAT BRODNIK

On the 24th March 1991, in the fourteenth season of the National Soccer League and the ninth in that competition for the club, striker Pat Brodnik, in the Brandon Park mud, scored six goals against West Adelaide. It was only three minutes in that Brodnik got on the score sheet. A left footed drive from distance slid off the damp surface into the net. It was in the thirty-first minute that Brodnik brought up his brace. Working with Paul McFadden, Brodnik moved in possession to the goal line before feigning to cross. He instead moved inward and produced a shot that flew in at the far post. His hat trick was achieved when the striker met a Danny Crainie cross and fired a low trajectory shot home. A strong wind and torrential rain made conditions that much worst but Brodnik scythed through the mud following a Crainie cross. David Ratcliffe nodded the ball to Brodnik who ultimately powered the ball in. David Skeen and Crainie combined before Brodnik, being on the end of Crainie's pass, played past the custodian to bring up number five. For the last of his haul, Randall Easthorpe's incisive pass allowed Brodnik to scamper through. He gained possession eluded the advancing goalkeeper to push the ball into the vacant goal.

## FIVE - SHANE MCGIRR

In the final round of the 2004/05 in the Challenger Group, the ace marksman Shane McGirr hit all five goals versus Sydney Crescent Star. In the away match played at Lidcombe Oval on the 14th May 2005, McGirr quickly goaled in the first minute and got his second six minutes later and this 2-0 score line remained at half time and up until the seventy-sixth minute. His final three goals were hit in a twelve-minute spree. A Crescent Star substitute goalkeeper was brought on as another player was sacrificed, as the selected custodian was red carded for a two-footed challenge. This did help matters but Crescent Star was a beaten team by this stage. However, this does not diminish the feat of McGirr who ended being both the Premier League and the Wolves Golden Boot winner.

## FOUR - MARSHALL SOPER, SCOTT CHIPPERFIELD (2) and STUART YOUNG

### Marshall Soper

At Brandon Park on the 10th July 1988, Soper scored four goals against Brisbane Lions in the 6-1 match. In scant time following the Wolves' first successful strike, he goaled. A Peter Kotamanidis corner kick travelled to David Ratcliffe. He then nodded the ball to Soper's feet and he proceeded to score. His second was brought up with Kotamanidis again involved, with corner kick flying to Jeff Ainsworth. Ainsworth, in crowded goalmouth booted the ball but it was Soper who managed to scramble the ball into the goal. On sixty-five minutes goalkeeper Warwick Young's up field clearing kick located Crainie. His ensuing rasping shot cannoned off the cross bar. Soper reacted quickly to pounce on the rebound to score. Rade Stefanovski created Soper's fourth and the team's fifth goal.

### Scott Chipperfield

Canberra Cosmos were on the end of an 8-0 hiding in Canberra when Scott Chipperfield went on a scoring rampage to score four on the 5th December 1997 at Brandon Park. The



Chipperfield goals emanated in the 20th, 36th, 40th, and 55th minutes and these were the Wolves first, fourth, fifth and seventh goals for the afternoon.

For his initial strike, he had picked an errant back pass to score and sixteen minutes later added his second, heading in an Alvin Ceccoli cross. Five minutes prior to the half time whistle, Chipperfield brought up his hat trick. Not finished with scoring, he added his fourth five minutes after the half time resumption of play.

### **Stuart Young**

It was in Round 30 when striker Stuart Young joined the four goals club on 14th April 2000 versus Canberra Cosmos at Bruce Stadium. Young scored the final four goals of the six that achieved. His initial goal emanated in the sixty- fourth minute. Chipperfield had provided a long pass, which caught the custodian in two minds whether to come or not with Young taking advantage to duly score. Young converted a penalty kick for his brace following Chipperfield being brought down by the

goalkeeper, who was summarily dismissed. He added two more in the final ten minutes.

### **Scott Chipperfield**

This was Chipperfield's second four goal single match total with the first coming in the eleventh minute at WIN Stadium, coming from a well judged header from a Matt Horsley cross on the 29th April 2001. His second came in the second half following another Horsley cross which was nodded down to him before he struck. A powerful Chipperfield shot brought up his third and his fourth came seven minutes later. The final result of this Round 30 encounter with Adelaide City was 6-2.

These players would have been looked upon as 'slicker than most' following these high scoring exploits by any supporters who witnessed these occasions. It is a feat to be proud of and these players helped their team enormously at the time and not to mention their own standing in the game.

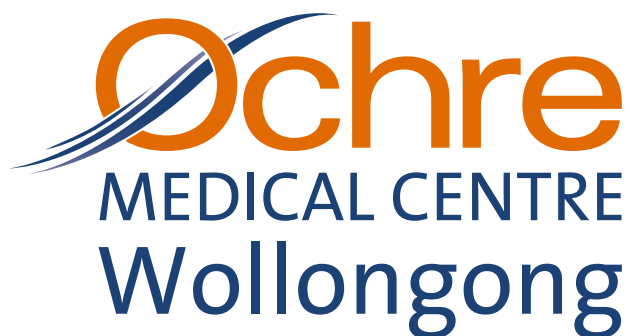

Since the 2004/05 NSW Premier League season, the Wolves have had a number of strikers who have been very proficient in front of goal, which of course is their job. 'Who'll will be the one', the stand out player who has the best goals per games ratio? All will be revealed but the players need to have played twenty or more games to feature. All results are up until the end of the 2017 season.

John Martinoski in his three years with the club achieved a 14% ratio scoring eight goals in fifty-six appearances from 2011 to 2013.

The Argentinean striker Nicolas Bernal, on the books for two seasons, 2016 and 2017, scored a total of ten goals in his thirty matches with a ratio of 30%.

With a marginally higher ratio, Mark Picciolini, a club Golden Boot winner, achieved twenty goals in sixty matches, a result of 33%.

Current striker Peter Simonoski at the conclusion of the 2017 season had scored the highest tally of goals in the Premier League competition, thirty-six in his years at the club in first grade, 2009, 2011 to 2018, amassing one hundred and two games with a ratio of 35%. Also on this result was Sasho Petrovski who scored fourteen goals in forty games in his second stint at the club from 2011-2012.

A two-season striker was also a Golden Boot winner and that was Ilija Prenzoski. He was at the club in 2008 and 2009 achieving forty games with a total of eighteen goals. His ratio was 45%.

Ricky Zucco played four seasons from 2012 to 2014 and again in 2016, amassing twenty-six goals in fifty-five appearances with a 47% ratio. He was a Golden Boot winner in addition.

Another Golden Boot winner in Daniel Aliffi has a 54% ratio after playing thirty-three games from 2006 to 2008 but not including his NSL appearances. He scored eighteen goals.

The runner up is a one-season player in Patrick Antelmi, who played twenty-one games in 2017, scoring a total of eleven goals, two of which did not count in the official NSW standings. However they are included here never the less. His ratio was 55%.

The striker with the best goals per game ratio was a player who played only a single season totaling twenty matches scoring eighteen goals, the Club Golden Boot winner and the league top scorer as well. His ratio of 90% is the best by a long way. It was in the 2004/05 season that he achieved his haul.

By way of a comparison, the best ratio in the National Soccer League is Sasho Petrovski who played eighty-one games scoring forty goals with a 49% ratio from his seasons 1998/99 to 2000/01. Also with the same result was Phil O'Connor with less games and goals than Petrovski. O'Connor made fifty-seven appearances scoring twenty-eight goals from 1982 to 1983. Stuart Young was next in line with a 46% ratio with sixty goals from one hundred and thirty four games from 1999/00 to 2003/04. The striker Vaughan Coveny was in fourth position scoring fifteen goals in thirty-eight games, a result of 39%, which was shared with Roy Cotton. He made fifty-seven appearances from 1992-83 and scored twenty-two goals.

'Who'll be the one' was none other than Shane McGirr, the striker with the most impressive goals per games ratio.

The Wolves have been fortunate to have hit seven goals on two occasions in their history stemming from 1981 but have also been on the receiving end of this high score line, thankfully only on one occasion with four players having experienced both the highs and the lows.

The first occasion was in 1990 with seven posted in the encounter with West Adelaide. In 2008 Macarthur Rams were at the mercy of the rampaging Wolves while it was in 2009 that the Marconi Stallions reversed the 'seven wonders'.

## 1990 - 19th March.

Coach by player David Ratcliffe the team for this match at Brandon Park was - George Bouhoutsos- (Gk), Jock Morlando, Ratcliffe, David Skeen, Ray Vlietstra, Zivko Hristovski, Jerry Murphy, Paul McFadden, Danny Crainie, Randall Easthorpe and Pat Brodnik.

It was a wild and wet weekend and this match played on a Sunday was played in muddy conditions. Three minutes after the start, Brodnik scored with a left footed shot from a fair distance out. The ball skidded on the surface before entering the goal. Midfielder Hristovski scored from his wind assisted corner kick in the twenty-seventh minute. McFadden and Brodnik swapped passes before Brodnik ventured to the goal line. He feigned a cross but then veered inwardly to propel the ball in at the far post. Crainie provided the assist when he curled in a cross. Brodnik met the ball to propel a low drive past the goalkeeper. During the second half conditions deteriorated. Just after the hour mark, Brodnik struck again. Ratcliffe subsequently headed on, following Crainie's corner kick to Brodnik. Skeen and Crainie combined before Crainie played an incisive pass for Brodnik to slot home. With three minutes remaining on the referee's watch striker Easthorpe played a defence splitting pass narrowly in the opposition half. This allowed Brodnik to get his skates on and he rounded the advancing custodian to slot home into the vacant goal. Brodnik was the first player to score six goals in the National Soccer League and Melbourne Knight player, Ivan Kelich a year later, equalled it.

## 2008 - 8th June.

This 'seven wonder' match was played at John Crehan Park, Cringila and the team consisted of - Justin Pasfield (Gk), Michael West, Ben Blake, Danial Cummins, Tynan Diaz, Steve Hayes, Ballamodou Conde, Chris Price, Des Giraldi, Matthew Bailey and Ilija Prenzoski. Alfredo Estevez, Lachlan Cahill and Mitchell Long subbed for Hayes, Price and Giraldi. The coach was John Turner.

Just after a quarter of an hour had elapsed, a Michael West header caused a flurry in the box. The ball ran free with Prenzoski being at the ready to tap it into the goal. Seventeen minutes later, a Price pass located Bailey. His placement was spot on for the second goal and this two-goal advantage stood until the second half. Price struck just after the resumption of play. He eluded two defenders with his skill then veered back inwardly. With the custodian out of position, an easy task befell Price and he did not disappoint. In the fifty-first minute Prenzoski intervened by anticipating a Rams pass, gaining possession. He calmly slotted home. Price chased down the ball and his subsequent shot was kept out. With Price still in the vicinity, a defender put the ball into his own net. On seventy minutes, Hayes took advantage as a defender went down on the slippery surface. Hayes took possession and rounded him to place the ball into the empty goal. Another opposition player lost his footing permitting Prenzoski to bring up his hat trick.

The scored could have blown out further as Diaz skimmed the cross bar and Cahill and Prenzoski went agonizingly close. Macarthur, conversely went close when one shot cannoned off the underside of the cross bar. However, it was not their day.

Turner, Blake and Hayes were interviewed post match. Turner intimated - 'it's the first time that we have taken all our chances. The boys were backing themselves in front of goal and it did their confidence a world of good. ... Chris Price was a standout, always in position, never stopped trying and kept his shape... Bailey was very good. It's pretty hard to pick a poor one.' Blake said 'It was a good performance all round. They gifted us



a couple of goals but it was pleasing to get our goal difference up in front of our home crowd. .... I try to keep out of trouble and kick along'. Hayes stated - 'it was good to finally score a few goals. We've wanted to do that for a long time. It's been coming. I am glad that it happened at out home ground to show that we are a good team. I was lucky. It was a tap in but I don't care how I get them.... Everyone was really working hard.'

In the vanquished Rams were two players who ended up playing in the A-League, those players being Kosta Barbarousis and Glen Trifiro.

The following game was when the result was the opposite of the previous two. .

### **2009 - 18th April 2009.**

Coached by Tony Pace, the team then known as Wollongong Community FC produced this line-up at Macedonia Park in Berkeley - Bryce Daenell (Gk), Dave Abel, Jamie Pitt, Keiran Deane, Ilija Prenzoski, Steve Hayes, Ballamodou Conde, Brendan Kearns, James Lawrence, Chris Nathaniel, and Aden Wade. Ben Bronneberg, Samet Kaynak and Jack Keating replaced Deane, Conde and Wade respectively with Tony Pace being the coach.

With the more experienced and number one goalkeeper Alex Augusto being injured in the warm-up and the usual back-up Matt Brandalise being sidelined through suspension, a hasty team change was enacted with the youngster Daenell being given his chance. Daenell from the Under 18s side had already played a full game and he was elevated late for this encounter. With gloomy weather and torrential rain making the pitch somewhat greasy, it did not seem to affect the visitors as they went on their scoring spree skipping out to an early lead, four minutes in. A shot smacked against the crossbar and a Marconi striker was there to blast home. It was another twenty-three minutes before Marconi goaled again. Daenell had made a great save but could not keep a firm grasp on the slippery ball. The first scorer moved in quickly to bring up his brace. A minute later, Daenell advanced to collect the ball but could not pin it down.

The clearance from a teammate defender went straight to another attacker. He passed it to a teammate and from close vicinity rammed the shot home.

The second half saw the score blow out further when five minutes after the resumption, Abel tackled a player and following his attempted clearance it went horribly wrong, flying into his own net. Daenell parried a shot, which was then headed straight back into the goal. With five minutes left ticking, a shot was angled inside the far post and the seventh was hit with a further two minutes onwards.

Despite the pasting, Wollongong had a number of opportunities to get on the scorecard with by Hayes, Prenzoski and Kaynak going close, but alas it was not the team's day.

Pace post match stated - 'It is a very difficult time at the moment. We have inexperienced players playing pedigree clubs..... I can't blame my players'.

It is not pleasant to experience a white wash of this magnitude but it happens in football but it doesn't necessarily define the abilities of the players concerned, just an 'off' day.

These 'seven wonders' have been a bonus and a minus for the teams but these certainly show the vagaries of football.

## ENGLISH OFFICIALS TO HIT THE NPL NSW MEN'S COMPETITION

Overseas talent is nothing new on the fields of New South Wales football, but in Round 20 of the National Premier Leagues NSW Men's competition there will be a different kind of elite foreign talent.

Former English Premier League referees Michael Salisbury and David Webb will be officiating two of Round 20's top-tier NPL NSW Men's matches with Manly United taking on Wollongong Wolves and Blacktown City hosting Rockdale City Suns penned in as the matches the duo will take over.

Salisbury will take charge of the clash at Cromer Park while Webb will oversee the big encounter at Lily's Football Stadium.

They will also be officiating in the NPL Victorian Premier League as part of their Australian visit.

One of Salisbury's major achievements as an official was getting his first taste of officiating at Wembley Stadium in May 2010 when he was appointed onto the National League play-off final as an assistant for the match between Oxford United v York City.

As a result from his performances as an assistant referee, he was then promoted into the professional game with his first appointment coming at Macclesfield Town.

After his time in the English lower leagues, Salisbury was then promoted into the English Premier League for the 2014/15 season and was an assistant referee for two seasons as well as

achieving a position on the FIFA International list in 2016.

One of his finest moments was ironically his final appointment before being promoted onto the EFL National Group of Referees where he was an assistant referee in the 2016 FA Cup Final between Manchester United and Crystal Palace.

Webb also comes with some quality pedigree.

After beginning his journey as a referee in 1999, he progressed through non-league football in the North East of England before being promoted to the EFL Assistant Referees list and the National League referees in 2008/09.

The last nine years has seen Webb referee in the Championship, League 1 and League 2 matches as well as major English Cup competitions.

Reflecting on his career, his major highlight thus far was officiating in the recent League 2 Play-Off Final at Wembley Stadium in front of 52,000 fans when Coventry City took on Exeter City.

This isn't the first time English Premier League referees have graced our football pitches in Sydney.

In 2016, Englishmen Stuart Atwell and Peter Banks both officiated in the NPL NSW Men's competition kick starting the relationship between our elite competition and the English game.

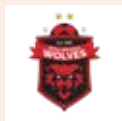

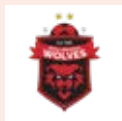

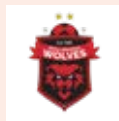
