The team from Edensor Park, Sydney United 58 and last season's finalists, come to WIN Stadium for the Round 14 clash with the Wollongong Wolves. Since 2004/05 NSW Premier League season, today's match will be the twenty-ninth meeting in the NSW based competition. The first Mens 1 Premier League match was a 1-0 victory to Sydney United 58 with Petar Markovic scoring at WIN Stadium. One hundred and eighty-nine goals have been scored between the two clubs in league games at a goal per game average of 2.8.

THE OPPOSITION TODAY - SYDNEY UNITED 58

New recruits to the 2019 Miro Vlastica coached Sydney United 58 include striker Peter Simonoski after his long stint from 2009 with the Wollongong Wolves, Judah Cleur from Marconi Stallions and former U17 and U20s Uruguayan international Sebastian Gallegos (a player who trialled for the Wolves against the Central Coast Mariners in October, 2018 from Hawkesbury City - NPL3) in addition with Liam Rose from Central Coast Mariners. In Round 2 new signing and former Wolves' player

and Central Coast Mariner, Joshua Macdonald made his debut off the bench to strengthen the squad. With the return of Tom Huskok after signing from Melbourne club, Melbourne Knights the club have added to strengthen the side. Huskok made his 2019 debut in Round 13.

The club from Edensor Park has been at the forefront of the game in NSW and has been successful over the years on many occasions. One such achievement was the 2006 Championship when the team defeated Blacktown City by 4-0. The team was Matthew Cox, Milan Bosnar, Joe Vrkic, Ante Juric, Todd Brodie, Petar Markovic, Ben Vidaic, Luka Glavas, Lisandro Berbis, Mitchell Thompson and Mile Jedinak. Ricky Perinich, Tallan Martin and Jim Bakis replaced Bosnar, Vidaic and Thompson respectively with Jean Paul De Marigny being the coach. Glavas was the lone goal scorer netting all four.

The 2018 campaign saw the club finishing with 38 points from 12 wins and 2 draws with 8 defeats in third position. The team won one finals match with a penalty shoot out win 5-3 after it was 1-1 after ninety minutes and after extra time with Patrick Antelmi being the scorer. Thirty-six goals were achieved with twenty-nine against with goal per games averages of 1.63 and 1.31. Six nil scores eventuated which was the second highest equaling three other teams with six clean sheets. In Rounds 1-11 sixteen goals

were scored with fourteen being conceded with a plus 2 goal difference. In Rounds 12-22 nineteen and fourteen was the outcome with a five-goal difference. The upshot is more goals were scored in the second half of the season with the same number being conceded but a slightly better goal difference. The top scorer was Christopher Payne with twelve goals with a season strike rate of 0.54. Eight other players contributed in the scoring department. The biggest winning margin was three, 3-0 in Rounds 5 and 15 with the highest losing margin being four, 2-6 in Round 20. The best sequence without losing was seven, in Rounds 15 -21, win, win, win, win, win, win and win. Multi-scorers in a single match were Nikas with a treble and Payne with two braces and the quickest goal came in the 9th minute of Round 19 scored by Adrian Vlastelica. Players who were selected in the 'Team Of The Week' were Panni Nikas with four, Payne (2), Manos (2), and Adrian Vlastelica, Petar Markovic and Matthew Sim with one each.

In the previous five years, the club has concluded the seasons in 9th, 7th, 1st, and 7th and in 2018 a 3rd position was achieved. These positions do show are a little of a roller coaster ride, however two finals appearances in five years is a plus.

THE MATCH - UP

The top scorer for each club is Thomas James (WW) and Peter Simonoski (SU58) with fifteen and seven goals respectively with each team scoring thirty-three and twenty goals.

Eight Wolves players have contributed to the scoring while the identical number of United personnel has done likewise.

The scorer of the team's previous goal is Thomas James (WW) and Matt Sim (SU58).

Sydney United has nineteen wins to the Wolves' seven in their match-ups since the 2004/05 season while United 58 has kept the Wolves scoreless in ten matches while the converse is five. To date in the 2019 competition, Sydney United have been kept scoreless on three occasions with the Wollongong team with only one nil result.

In the previous round Sydney United 58 was defeated 4-2 by Blacktown City FC while the Wolves put four past APIA Leichhardt with nil in reply.

Sydney United 58's best and worst results in 2019 are 3-0 and 0-5 as against the Wolves 4-0 and 0-1. Each team has conceded eleven (WW) and twenty-one (SU58) goals with a plus 22 and minus 3 goal difference respectively.

The Wolves hold pole position on the point's table on thirty points from nine wins and three draws and are six points ahead of the nearest club, while Sydney sit in fourth position gaining six wins and three draws and earning twenty-one points.

The result sequence in the previous five games for Sydney United 58 is win, draw, loss, win and loss, while the Wolves have win, loss, win, win and win.

PLAYERS TO WATCH

Goalkeeper Tom Manos has been the incumbent custodian for four years and has been impressive in his domain. He is extremely effective in tacking high

balls into the box, and he is brave on one on ones should they eventuate.

Striker Peter Simonoski would like nothing better in scoring against his previous club and he scored a hat trick in his first game in 2019 for his new club. He is very mobile and knows where the goal is.

Wolves' holding midfielder, Takeru Okada has taken to the Mens 1 with panache and ease and has been impressive in providing assists for goals and has been a big part of the engine room of the home team. As a measure of his displays, he has been included in the 'Team Of The Week on no less than two occasions. Of late he has added his name to the score sheets in a couple of matches with well taken goals, four in three subsequent matches.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Round 17 2008 was played at Crehan Park on Saturday, 19th July before an enthusiastic crowd on a cold winter's night.

The John Turner coached Wolves team consisted of Michael Turnbull, Ben Blake (Capt.), Danial Cummings, Chris Price, Tynan Diaz, Steve Hayes, Michael Hawrysiuk, Ballamodou Conde, Ilija Prenzowski, Dez Giraldi, with substitutes Matthew Bailey, Alfredo Estevez and Mitchell Long coming on for Diaz, Conde and Giraldi.

Sydney United was Vedran Janjetovic, Josip Moric, Milan Bosnar, Damon Collina, Joe Vrkic, Todd Brodie, Luka Glavas, Mark Robertson, Chris Boyle, Saso Trajcevski and Ivo Bosnar. Dennis Cutura, Mitchell Thompson and Elsid Barkhousir replaced Collina, Boyle and Trajcevski. The coach was Ivan Petkovic.

Sydney United came to town intent of consolidating their Top Five position. However, the Wolves closed their opponents especially the dangerous Glavas to keep their attacks at bay. It was in the thirty-seventh minute when the home team ploughed ahead. Prenzowski picked up a long pass out of his team's defensive line before moving forward at speed before looping the ball over Janjetovic's head into the goal. Seven minutes later, Conde virtually walked the ball into the goal following Bailey's inroad into United's territory. His shot across the face of goal was met by Conde to keep winning margin in tact. Hawrysiuk struck the cross from a Price corner kick. Try as they might, M. Bosnar, Collina and Robertson plus Barkhousir produced efforts on goal

but could not convert, with Turnbull saving many of these attempts.

On the hour mark, Bailey achieved number three. Giraldi provided a clever back heel and Bailey struck, producing an outside of the right shot that eluded the diving custodian. Turner stated - 'things are falling into place. It is a special group of players that work for each other....' Cummins - 'We know what each will (Blake) and it makes it a lot easier when you understand each other. We worked for each other and we fight for each other....' Bailey - 'It came off the boot really nicely. John said at half time to have a go from range and I did....'. Diaz - 'Its going really well. The boys are enjoying it. And it's an absolute pleasure to play in this team....'

WOLVES' PLAYER OF NOTE - SAMET KAYNAK

Kaynak was striker who played for the first grade side at the club in 2006, 2008, 2009 2010 and 2011. His most important achievement, and this season's debut goal, was in the 2008 Grand Final versus Sutherland Sharks. The ball was cleared up field in the ninety-fourth minute and was headed on by Ilija Prenzowski. Kaynak had only the custodian to beat. He feigned then rounded him to push the ball into an empty goal frame for his team's fourth goal. He stated post match - 'I was nervous taking on the 'keeper but I got around him to score. It was a great feeling.' In this season, he had one starting appearance and three from the bench. In 2009 he made ten starts and 2 subs with one goal. One sub in 2010 and the next year had 3 starts and 6 subs plus three cup appearances with a brace in the quarter final with Parramatta. For his first goal the influential Andres Gomez moved up field before supplying a pinpoint high pass to Kaynak. He controlled the ball at the far post and placed out of the custodian's reach. Gomez played an incisive for Mark Piccolini who played Kaynak in. The custodian came to knock the striker off kilter, but Kaynak recovered and regathered the ball to dispatch it subsequently into the goal. Kaynak - 'Finally a lot has gone my way. There was a lot of good build up play with Andres and Pich, which made my job easier.'

SYDNEY UNITED PLAYER OF NOTE - ANTE MILICIC

Milicic was a striker who played 119 appearances with 16 as a substitute scoring a total of 38 goals from season 1992/93 to 1996/97. He also has

played in the A-League with Newcastle Jets and Queensland Roar plus overseas jaunts in Holland, Croatia and Malaysia. He is now a coach, being a former assistant manager of the Socceroos and now coach of the Matildas. His final league goal for the club in his first of four Sydney United stints was in 1995/96 Round 25 Newcastle Breakers match. On forty-nine minutes, an Ante Moric cross flew in. Milicic's shot went in off the post. He also got his name on the scoreboard when his strike sent his club into Grand Final. It was the only goal of the Preliminary Final. A Kresimir Marusic corner kick found the head of a diving David Zdrilic at the near post. Unlucky for him, the ball went across the goal instead of in. However, Milicic was in the area and he blasted the ball home in the sixty-eight minute into the net.

Following the 1996/97 season, he went to two Dutch clubs before returning to Sydney United for the 2000/01 season, achieving eight goals from fourteen games. This was a solitary season and he returned once more for the club in the 2004/05 season and again in 2009. He is currently the coach of the Matildas now and in the Women's World Cup and will coach new A-League club Macarthur FC in the 2020/2021 season.

SELECTED REPRESENTATIVE OF BOTH CLUBS - MARIO JERMEN

Jermen played one season with the Wolves that was sandwiched in between his stints at Sydney United. It was the 1995/96 season and he shared the Golden Boot award with Tony Perinich with a tally of nine goals. Making eighteen starting appearances and six from the bench he assisted the team in winning games. His initial strike was in the Round 18 Marconi Stallions encounter. The ball was belted up field with the Marconi custodian knocking it forward with a foot. It went to another Wolves' player who pushed it forward again. This time Jermen got a touch to project the ball into the goal through a sea of legs five before half time.

The striker played for the Sydney United club in the 1992/93 and concluded his tenure after his fifth season in the 1999/00 one. For Sydney United he scored a total of ten goals with his biggest haul of three coming in his final season. He made fifty-seven appearances for United.

The most 'common' score in football question would give responders time to think and some different answers would pop up. Some studies have been forthcoming overseas in this regard and these results will be compared to those of the Wollongong Wolves.

In a study on the four tiers of English football from 1888 through to the end to 2013/14 season, the three most occurring score lines were 1-1, 1-0 and 2-1 in that order with a 11.6%, 9.8% and 8.9% ratio of scores to games with 0-1 and 1-2 scores being incorporated in these.

The scores of all Wollongong Wolves games have been tabulated and the highest most common score incidence is the 1-1 score with an 11.19% scores per games ratio with 105 incidences. This has been calculated up to the conclusion of the 2018 season. The next best was 1-2 with 7.88% with 74 occurrences, followed by 0-1 in third position with 7.78% and 73 incidences. Following in fourth was 2-1 with a 7.56% ratio and 71 occurrences. The Wolves have followed suit with the first place 1-1 score line with the English football study.

If, however if the 1-0 and 0-1 ratios were added together like in the English study, it would be 14.28% and if the 2-1 and 1-2 were likewise joined, the ratio would be 15.44% and the rating would be changed. However, the results are being kept separate for the purposes of this article.

In 2018, the most common score was 1-1 with five occurrences having a 22.7% ratio, with the next being 2-1 with four and 18.18%, with 1-0 and 0-1 tying with two each at 9.09%. By way of the contrast with the prior season, 2017 and the 1981 season, 3-0 and 2-1 were the most prevalent score line in 2017 having four occurrences each and 18.18%, with 1-2 the next in line having 13.6%, while in the 1981, the 1-1 had eight occurrences at 26.6% and 0-1 with five and a 16.6% ratio followed by 2-1 with three and a ratio of 13.6%.

Which years had the highest ratio of the 1-1, 1-2 and 0-1 score lines? In the 1983 season there were nine 1-1 draws with a 30% ratio while the 2011 season had six 1-2 results which was the highest incidence with a 27.2% ratio. In two seasons, the 1981 and 1991/92 years, both boasted five 0-1 results having the most occurrences, with both resulting in a 16.66% ratio.

In 2019 up until Round 13, the most occurring score line was 4-0 achieved on three occasions with two times each with 2-0 and 2-2 and these occurred with one each of score lines 1-1, 2-1, 0-1, 3-0, 3-1 and 4-3. The 4-3 result was only the second time since 1981 that this result occurred.

In total, there were only eight score lines that eventuated with one single incidence and there were forty-four different scores in total that were posted in all the league games since 1981.

Many goals have been scored from the 'spot' and these are a selection of the instances that led to these successful conversions (with a couple of misses thrown in for good measure). Penalty takers have the advantage in these one on one battles with the custodians but not all go according to plan. There have been some monumental misses and some exquisite goalkeeper saves. Penalty takers need to concentrate before taking the kick and pick the direction that they want the ball to travel.

The most recent time that a 'spot' kick was converted was in 2019 Round 6 Mt.Druitt Town Rangers at WIN Stadium. A Takeru Okada cross had flown into the box. Central defender Nick Littler charged in to meet the ball but was inconvenienced unfairly, thereby winning a penalty kick. Striker Thomas James, the designated penalty taker stepped up. He dispatched the spot kick with power and it lodged into the goal at the lower left hand corner.

Striker Peter Beggs hit one from the spot in 1984's Round 16 against Brisbane Lions after Peter Kotamanidis was inconvenienced in the eightieth minute to put his team ahead for the first time in the encounter.

In the final round of the 2017 season a penalty kick was signified in the forty-fourth minute. Steve Hayes and Yuzo Tashiro were involved before Patrick Antelmi was brought down in the box by a Sydney FC defender. He rose to his feet and was near the spot. With a swift kick of the ball Antelmi converted for his first goal of a hat trick. His left footed effort angled into the right side of goal with the goalkeeper diving the other way.

Round 2 1987 saw the Rockdale City play each other and in this fixture Bryan Cokely was inconvenienced before central defender Jock Morlando stepped up to dispatch the ball home in a consummate fashion. He did likewise two rounds onward versus Blacktown City.

The top scorer of 2009 Ilija Prenzoski brought up his brace when converting from the spot in the Round 2 Bonnyrigg White Eagles match at John Crehan Park, Cringila. Captain Steve Hayes was impeded with a shirt tug and the referee signaled a penalty. Prenzoski, the experienced striker, made no mistake, dispatching his effort with confidence and panache to bulge the back of the net.

Following Zeljko Babic and a Perth Glory defender



being tangled together in the box, a penalty kick was forthcoming outcome. Stuart Young, in this Round 9 2002/03 fixture, guided the ball into the back of the net, beating the right-gloved hand of a diving custodian. In the 2003/04 season Osagie Nwaogazi had zipped into the Melbourne Knights' box and in his attempt to leap a defender he was caught and felled by the defender's flailing leg. The Knights protested the decision, but to no avail. Young, as captain, decided to take the kick. His left footed shot zoomed into the goal in the fiftieth minute to earn a draw.

Against St George in the 1989/90 season and immediately prior to the half time break, the referee detected a Saint's defender's handball. Midfield player Zivko Hristovski strode to the spot. He dispatched a powerful effort to give his team the lead. Later in this season, he again converted another penalty kick by slamming the ball into the Blacktown City goal after Paul McFadden had been knocked over.

When the Wolves played Parramatta in the 1992/93

season, Matthew Horsley had made a marauding run through the middle before off loading a pass to Mike Smith. A defender subsequently held this midfielder back and a penalty kick ensued. The vastly experienced Charlie Yankos took the kick and made an easy conversion. Against Heidelberg United, Dale White was dragged off the ball in the twenty-ninth minute, Yankos duly hit home once again to assist the team with his customary strong shot. A minute following the hour mark,

In the 2007 season striker Daniel Aliffi hit a penalty into the Sutherland Sharks goal of the Round 10 fixture at Seymour Shaw Park. He doubled this effort later in this season by hitting two from the penalty mark in the Tiger Turf Cup Final. At the minute past the hour, Aliffi burst into the box to be unceremoniously dumped. He regained his feet and struck home with his ensuing spot kick. The ball traversed to the right of the Manly United custodian at Seymour Shaw Park, Miranda. Sixteen minutes he repeated the effort. With a forward thrust by Steve Hayes ending with an inconvenience that halted his momentum, another penalty decision was forthcoming. Aliffi directed this time to the left of the custodian.

In the first season of 1981 in Round 4 the opposition was Brisbane Lions at Richland Stadium in Brisbane. It was in the twenty-seventh minute that midfielder John Lathan was tackled unfairly on the edge of the box. Lee Adam's ensuing penalty kick was achieved to earn a draw. At Schintler Reserve in Melbourne, in Round 17, with three minutes of the match remaining, a Clive Campbell shot hit the hand of a defender, whether deliberate or not was open to question. Never the less, a penalty was awarded. Adam duly banged the ball in. In 1982, in Round 21, a handball was detected and Adam powered past the Canberra City goalkeeper in the fifty-sixth minute.

In the relegation battle of 2013, striker Ricky Zucco claimed the penalty after a Central Coast Mariners Academy player had handled the ball in the fifty-seven minute. Zucco had the confidence to take the kick. His strongly hit shot flew to the left of centre into the goal as the custodian dived in the opposite direction.

Peter Willis in 1985 Round 3 Sydney City match struck his penalty home following Zivko Hristovski being bundled over. In the 1984 season, a defender

narrowly inside the penalty area caught Peter Kotamanidis foot. Willis moved to the spot, and his sweetly placed his effort lodged into the APIA Leichhardt goal immediately after the teams came on the field for the second half.

It was fifteen minutes when the midfielder Anthony Surjan hit one in from the to spot to beat the Adelaide City custodian for the game's second goal after the opposition had got onto the score sheet two minutes prior in Round 21 in the 1998/99 season. Scott Chipperfield had been brought down unceremoniously before Surjan stepped forward to plough his low shot into the right corner of the net. In Round 13 in the 1997/98 season, Chipperfield was fouled once more. Surjan scored his fourth penalty of the season when he dispatched the ball past the Carlton 'keeper to bring up his team's second goal. Earlier in the season in the Round 6 Marconi encounter, after seventy minutes, a Jason Connolly strike was handled in the box. Surjan, who was to the fore in general play, was on hand to drive his spot kick into the goal.

Midfield player Steve Karavatakis in the same 1998/99 Round 21 Adelaide City match as Surjan, converting his penalty twenty-eight minutes later. Michael Brooks had zoomed his shot in only for a defender to stop his effort with a hand. A penalty and a red card ensued. With two minutes left on the clock, Karavatakis added the icing on the cake with the team's fourth goal.

A twenty-two minute penalty kick was given when Andrew Paine gained possession of a through ball in the opening round in 2010. Being one on one with Bonnyrigg White Eagles' custodian, Paine eluded him before he could pull the trigger. A desperate defender arrived on the scene to close things down. Unfortunately for him, he stopped Paine's progress with a despairing lunge and received a red card for his troubles. Paine took the spot kick, slotting in as the custodian dived the wrong way.

The Marconi custodian inconvenienced a marauding Mark Picciolini in this 2012 Round 6 match. He had come off his line to bring the striker to the ground. Mark Picciolini subsequently rose to convert from the spot to exact revenge. He repeated the effort in Round 9 after a Blacktown defender brought down Peter Simonoski. He powered the ball home with nary a touch from the custodian. The striker also hit a spot kick home in the Cup Match versus Parramatta

Eagles in 2011. Peter Simonoski had been pole axed by the custodian with the following play, Picciolini dispatched the ball high into the goal on sixty-nine minutes.

In the 1988 season, striker Randall Easthorpe had been fouled when he raced into the penalty area. Jeff Ainsworth, the English midfielder and team captain was the one to take the resultant penalty kick and he sent his effort strongly into goalkeeper's domain.

In extra time in the 2014 Round 5 Waratah Cup match with Sutherland Sharks at Hooka Creek (Macedonia) Park, Darcy Madden was severely impeded when he charged into the penalty area. Substitute Matthew Bailey stepped forward to take the penalty, dispatching the ball with skill into the goal on one hundred and twenty-minutes, thus forcing the game into a penalty shoot out. Madden stated – 'I got a favourable decision and that's football'.

A 'spot' kick was converted was in 2018 Round14 Sydney FC match at WIN Stadium. Peter Simonoski had threaded a pass for Joshua Macdonald to burst into the box. The Sydney FC central defender tangled with the quick Joshua Macdonald to impede his progress and going to ground as a consequence. The penalty kick was duly awarded. Peter Simonoski stepped up to the mark, hitting the ball to the right of centre, beating the custodian as he dived the opposite way. The striker hit two further spot kicks to convert in the one match, this being the Round 5 Cup match in 2015. He breached the Kellyville Kolts domain twice in a row. With Bradley Welch being inconvenienced, Simonoski projected the ball high into the net. His second after a handball decision went in the same direction as his first effort.

Kicks from the 'spot' can go awry, witness France's consummate player, Michel Platini's penalty kick in the 1986 World Cup in Mexico versus Brazil, Roberto Baggio's in the 1994 World Cup Final versus Brazil and David Beckham's Euro 2004 Qualifier v Turkey in October 2003. Platini pushed the ball to his left, high over the left hand corner of the goal. Baggio lifted the ball down the centre to fly over the cross bar by some considerable margin. Beckham's kick soared high into the stratosphere. Closer to home, in the 1982 Round Footscray J.U.S.T. match a penalty was given against the home team, Roy Cotton was taken from behind. Lee Adam, who scored more from the spot than he missed, stepped up to the mark. He powered the ball in. The custodian lunged

to his left and managed to prevent the ball from in from entering his realm. The referee said he moved, ordering the penalty to be re-taken. Adam had a second bite of the cherry. However, the identical thing happened but this time play was waved on.

As can be seen, even the very best can somehow miss, as even the Wolves' own Matthew Horsley, who stuck his spot kick wide of the post in the 1999/2000 season NSL Grand Final can attest. Besides this example and Adam's, there have been the spot kicks that the Wolves have failed to convert over the years but the majority of aforementioned ones have been the success stories.

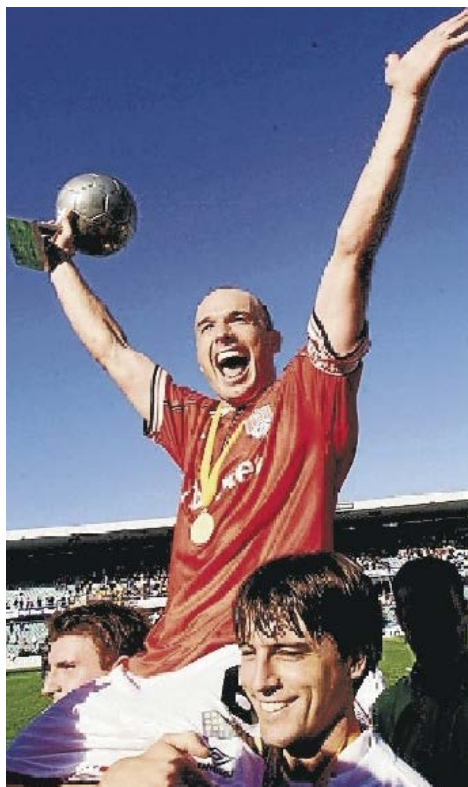


Only three players in the history of the club have won the club's top accolade, the 'Player Of The Year' award on more than one occasion. The seasons of these award winners have been 1991/92, 1993/94, 1994/95, 1995/96, 1996/97, 2014, 2015 and 2016 with the players concerned being a goalkeeper, a midfielder and a midfielder/defender. 'Here's to you', Matthew Horsley, Zac Mackenzie and Brett Hughes. Two of these players have been granted a treble of this award while the other has two.

Of course, everyone makes mistakes at some time and even the best players are not exempt from this. However, the overriding issue is the consistently high performances that have been displayed.

It was in the 1991/92 season that Matthew Horsley achieved his first award of three. He made a total of twenty-six appearances with one as a replacement with a one-goal tally. His first starting match was in Round 3 versus West Adelaide and his final match of the season was on the 7th march against Newcastle in the league and against Adelaide City in the finals play-offs. His goal came Round 14 win over APIA Leichhardt. He produced a first time volley from the edge of the penalty area after the opposition custodian had punched the ball out from a Mike Smith corner kick. In the Marconi Round 4 fixture, Horsley broke out in the seventy-ninth minute to subsequently to pass inward to Richard Lloyd who calmly slotted home. In the narrow loss to Adelaide City Horsley carved open the defence with a cross from the right but the opportunity was spurned when a teammate's header traversed wide.

Horsley's second season award was in the 1994/95 season with twenty-three starting appearances and a three-goal achievement. His first match was in Round 1 Marconi match and his final one of the season was in Round 26. His first goal of the season was in Round 13 versus Sydney Olympic at Brandon Park. Horsley earned the plaudits with his performances in the Parramatta Eagles and Sydney United Round 6 and 7 games and again in the win over South Melbourne. He showed his tremendous ability and high work ethic and he led by his example as the captain of the team from the outset of the season. In the Adelaide City loss, Horsley headed the ball into the box for Vaughn Coveny to score. In Round 13, Horsley scored from a rebound when the Sydney Olympic custodian palmed out a Mathew



Dihm shot. It was a powerful effort that zoomed into the goal.

His third such season that he earned the honour was in 1996/97 with a seven goal haul from twenty-six appearances. He was still the captain of the side and in his initial start in Round 1, he scored a brace in a high scoring draw with Sydney United away. Following good lead-up work by Neil Harlock and a Nick Josevski cross, an unattended Horsley managed to drive his low shot into the goal. For his brace, Michael Reda had broken out from the centre and produced a pass for Horsley to run onto. He did so and made a shot that flew into the far corner of the goal. In Round 2 Alvin Ceccoli had pumped the ball forward from the back to the goal with the custodian mishandling the ball as Sasho Dimoski challenged. Horsley was in the vicinity to slam it home. The captain provided the impetus for

his team's comeback versus Brisbane Strikers but the loss was still the end result. Against Canberra Cosmos in Round 25, he scored with a header. He led the team to success in this season by winning the Waratah Cup. In his final league game of the season in Round 26, Horsley goaled with header of an Anthony Surjan cross. Horsley also led the team in to the finals winning the two-legged Adelaide City Elimination Final before bowing out to Marconi.

In these award-winning seasons Horsley played in a midfield role. He was an energetic player with a high work ethic, being a good crosser of the ball and he set up his supports with precision passes and had composure in difficult situations. He had good acceleration and speed on his runs. In many matches during the season, he gained many points in the 'Player of the Year' as a testament to his consistency.

Midfielder Zac Mackenzie's first of three awards came in the 2014 season when he made twenty-one appearances with one from the bench, with an additional three starts and one replacement role in the Cup. Three selections were gained the 'Team Of The Week' in Rounds 2, 15 and 17 versus Sutherland Sharks, Rockdale City Suns and Sydney United respectively. Against the Sharks, he made a lot of the running, producing incisive passes to his supports with Chris Price and Darcy being the recipients and harassed the opponents by moving in their direction quickly. Against Marconi in Round 21, he headed out in succession to keep his team on the front foot and was an influential presence in the midfield. Post Match he stated, - We started a bit shakily and we were all over the place for the first twenty-five minutes. We sort of came together better and were more compact.' In the FFA Cup Round Of 32 against the Central Coast Mariners, Mackenzie imposed himself in the play and assisted his team superbly.

In 2015, fourteen appearances were achieved and to attain the top prize from this number of games was special. Mackenzie's initial start was in Round 1 Sydney Olympic match with his final season match in Round 22. In Round 16 after the loss to Blacktown Spartans, he stated post match-' It was disappointing, but we switched off at the outset and they got the jump on us and we really did not turn up in the first half. The second half was better. We played into their hands a bit by pushing a lot of players forward and they sneaked one at the end

and by that stage the game was a bit over.' In this match the midfielder determinedly backtracked to win the ball with an effective tackle and in an earlier instant showed his versatility by projecting his header towards the opponent's goal. Two rounds earlier, Mackenzie headed out to see off a Sydney United threat and set up Peter Simonoski to his attempt with an audacious chip. Against APIA Leichhardt, Mackenzie displayed his defensive mettle. In Round 12 with Sydney Olympic being the opposition, Mackenzie was in the forefront of the battles with Olympics' men. He screened the ball well and held his own in the tackle. In his final match of the season in the Elimination Semi-Final against Sydney Olympic, he met a Joseph Lavalle corner kick and got his head to meet it projecting the ball downwards but ultimately it went wide but the intent was there. He gained selection in the Men's 1 'Team Of The Week' in Rounds 12 and 17 versus Sydney Olympic and Parramatta FC.



In his third award-winning year of 2016, he made twenty appearances plus three starts and one replacement entry in the Cup. He gained selection in Men's 1 'Team Of The Week' on two occasions in Rounds 5 and 18 as a measure of his standing. In the APIA match his tackling was sound to keep out APIA's attempts to get back into the match, and made timely interventions and providing perceptive passes out of defence. In the Blacktown City encounter, was a tower of strength with his defensive duties and attacked when the opportunity presented itself. Proving to be a thorn to Blacktown, he was brought down on the edge of the box as burst through. He stated post match-'we gave away three soft goals and then we were chasing the game but we easily could have got something at the end. I thought Stefan was going to get one (a penalty) towards the end...I've been playing a bit more forward in the last couple of games and it has been a bit of a change for me. It has been good, but we can't get the results.' Prior to the 2016 Round Of 32 Sydney FC match, Mackenzie stated - 'we are pretty excited and looking forward to it for a long time. We give it our best shot, we will give it a red hot go.' In the game towards the end he stood his ground after being tackled by Matt Simon. In a specific incident, Mackenzie blocked an attempted cross to see off the danger and kept the team ticking over with his passing and ball winning efforts. Post match-'we did quite well and then we had a ten to fifteen minute period where we sort of lost our shape and they scored two goals and put us to bed. We had a few chances, which could have gone in, but we did not hold it together. ... It was big relief with the pressure (relegation) off everyone's shoulders. We enjoyed the game a whole more without that hanging over our heads.'

For a tall player, his close ball skill was paramount and his interventions were timely and acute. He was a robust tackler and had a high work rate. He was adept at holding off markers with his distribution being highly effective.

The custodian Brett Hughes' first season as an award winner was in 1993/94 season making twenty-six appearances. Seven clean sheets were attained versus Parramatta Eagles, Adelaide City x2, South Melbourne x2, Sydney United and West Adelaide. His initial start was in Round 1 versus Newcastle and final season game was in Round 26. In the Morwell Falcons Round 3 encounter Hughes deflected a

strike from a goal scorer round the post to thwart his brace. In the scoreless draw with Parramatta Eagles, the custodian made three match saving interventions to salvage a point for his team in a 'Man Of The Match' performance with his team a man down following a send off immediately after the hour mark. In the loss to Sydney Olympic in Round 23 three reflex saves by Hughes kept the score was blowing out. In Round 21 another quick refined Hughes save denied the Melbourne Knights from achieving an equalizer.

In the 1995/96 season, the custodian attained thirty-two appearances with four clean sheets to his credit. Hughes in the Marconi Round 29 denied a striker who was causing problems with a fine save to keep his domain intact and he kept it this for the duration of the match. Against Olympic in Round 6, he blocked drives by two attackers and against the same team in the first leg of the Cup match Hughes was faced with a one on one with Robbie Slater and managed to pull a fantastic save to deny what looked like a certain goal. His clean sheets were achieved against South Melbourne, Marconi x2 and Newcastle Breakers. He was an agile goalkeeper with quick reflexes, safe hands and a strong punch out with a presence of mind on crosses and distributed the ball capably.

The aforementioned players have certainly impressed significantly through their performances to win the 'Player Of The Year' award a number of times. These players have definitely deserved these accolades. Again, 'here's to you - Matthew Horsley, Zac Mackenzie and Brett Hughes.


