MATCH PREVIEW

V SYDNEY OLYMPIC

The Sydney Olympic team is the visitors for today's Round 4 clash at Albert Butler Memorial Park in the 2022 NPL NSW Mens 1 competition. Since the first meeting in 1981, the Wolves have scored an average of 1.16 goals per game whilst Sydney Olympic has 1.7 goals per game. This should be a mesmerizing match-up.

THE OPPOSITION TODAY – SYDNEY OLYMPIC

Coach Ante Juric has brought in young players Sam McIlhatton and Matthieu Cordier from APIA Leichhardt together with former Northbridge Bulls player Niko Ujdar as four players have departed. A further big signing is former Central Coast Mariner and Newcastle Jets striker, Roy O'Donovan.

Sydney Olympic in the years since the club's beginning as Pan Hellenic in 1957 has been successful in winning premierships, championships and cup finals. One such Cup final was in 1985 when the team played Preston-Makedonia. The team on that successful day was Gary Meier, Jim Ziras, Martyn Rogers, George Haniotis, Chris Polias, Stuart Johnstone, Graham Jennings, Alex Lambropoulos, Peter Katholos, Peter Raskopoloulos, Mark Koussas, Simon Ogun and Marshall Soper. The game was played at St. George Stadium before a crowd of 6147, Preston scored first after twelve minutes. It took until nine minutes to go before Soper equalized. Two minutes later, Raskopoulos netted the winner.

In the seventeen rounds of the 2021 pandemic aborted season, Sydney Olympic occupied fifth position on twenty-four points achieved from seven victories and three draws. Twenty-two goals were scored with Mo Adam's six goals topping the count with ten players in all making scoring contributions. On five occasions the team did not score with 5-1 being the best result with 1-3 being the least impressive. Adam was the sole multiple scorer in a single game with his brace in Round 10 and Adam Parkhouse achieved the fastest goal, a seventh minute strike in Round 13 Rockdale Ilinden rendezvous. The most impressive result sequence without loss was four matches on two occasions -Rounds 7-10 win, draw, win and win and Rounds13 -16, draw, win, win and win. Eleven players were selected in 'Team Of The Week' with Mohammed

Adam on top with three selections with Brendan Cholakian, Tom Whiteside, Jason Madonis and Michael Glassock with two each. Nick Sorras, Benjamin Van Meurs, Fabian Monge, Danial Dias, Oliver Purflett and Fabio Ferreira with one apiece.

THE MATCH UP

To date, both teams have one win and a draw and occupy fifth and sixth on the competition ladder with the Wolves having a six to three goal for and against as against Olympics' three to two goal goal difference.

The top scorer for each team is Lachlan Scott (WW) and Roy O'Donovan (SO) with two apiece. The last player to have scored is Nick Littler (WW) and Adam Parkhouse (SO) in the 90+2nd and 69th minutes respectively of their Round 2 assignments. Five different players have scored for the home team while two have done the deed for Olympic. Each team has one nil score.

The three rounds result sequence is WW- loss, win and draw, SO – loss, draw and win. The Wolves most impressive score was 4-0 in Round 2 and 2-0 for Sydney Olympic with Northbridge Bulls being the teams that was defeated.

PLAYERS TO WATCH

Roy O'Donovan is a striker with experienced in the A-League scoring a total of fifty goals with two stints at Newcastle Jets together with Central Coast Mariners and Brisbane Roar. He has scored two goals for Olympic this season and will be dangerous for the Wolves. He is a sharpshooter.

Joshua Macdonald is a winger with good close skill and takes on players with panache and ability. He has scored one goal thus far this season and will be eager to increase his tally should the opportunity arise. He will twist and turn in eluding players and will be a handful for the Olympic right side defenders.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

In the 2010 season it was a Round 9 meeting played at Belmore sports Ground. Olympic was Paul Henderson, Josh Lawson, Ricky Perenich, Chris Triantis, Cedric Ramirez, Andre Gumprecht, Phil Makrys, Matthew Mayora, Iain Ramsey, Steven



Tibbets and Luke Gearin. Tayfun Devrimol, James Monie and Dimitri Petratos replaced Lawson, Ramirez and Mayora respectively. Conversely the Wolves were represented by Brody Crane, Tynan Diaz, Alex Mansueto, Greg Valic, Nick McInerney, Lisandro Berbis, Andrew Keep, Tayfun Buyyukopru, Mark Picciolini, Jason Trifiro and Andrew Paine. Ken Chun and Keiran Deane came on for Keep and Paine respectively.

Olympic was quick off the blocks to mount an attacking foray but Keep hit the cross bar to make things interesting. However, five minutes in Ramirez was put through with only Crane to beat. He ventured off his line to scuttle the attempt. However, Olympic was not be denied two minutes on. Ramsey put the defence under pressure with his cross and Triantis was to pounce and slot it in the lower right corner of the goal. Picciolini, Keep and Paine tried to even up but all in vain. Olympic went further ahead on sixteen minutes. Makyrys passed to Triantis who crossed to Ramirez to score. The game became a little more physical with the tackling before converted an opportunity. The Olympic defence tried to scramble the ball out only for it to

fall to Picciolini. The striker struck with an impressive finish. He added another after Paine's good lead-up and shot, which Henderson pushed out. Picciolini took possession of the loose ball to ram it home. The Wolves had restored parity. With twenty minutes to go a Makry's free kick struck the cross bar to signal Olympics' intent. Two Minutes later, Ramirez met a Makrys' cross to push the ball into the goal. A Makrys' shot from distance brought up the desired outcome and the home had achieved a 4-2 victory.

THREE SELECTED GOALKEEPERS FOR SYDNEY OLYMPIC - GARY MEIER, ZAIM ZENELI and PAUL HENDERSON

Meier was at the Olympic club from 1974 to the 1993/94 season. From 1977, the advent of the NSL, he made two hundred and ninety six appearances. He was a tall custodian who could take high balls with relative ease. He achieved eighty-eight clean sheets, which was the most in the NSL for the club.

Zeneli played for Olympic in the 2010 NPL season and went to South Melbourne in 2011 and played for Dandenong Thunder and South Melbourne again before signing for North Sunshine Eagle.

Custodian Henderson first played for Olympic in 2010 and made fifteen appearances after coming from North Queensland Fury, the A-League club. He returned to Olympic in 2001 and was there until 2019 amassing two hundred and sixteen appearances. He was in goal when Olympic annexed the NSW Premier League title and he NSW Goalkeeper Of the Year in 2012. Henderson began his career at Sutherland Sharks in 1996.

THREE SELECTED GOALKEEPERS FOR WOLLONGONG WOLVES - JIM PRESTON, DANIEL COLLISON and ADAM BRODBECK

Preston played forty-seven times for the Wolves from 1981 to 1983 including one sub replacement in 1981. Eight clean sheets were achieved and he was also in goal for the two finals matches in 1982 plus quite a number in cup competitions. His debut was in the Round 1 Sydney Olympic game with his final game being the Round 30 Brisbane City bash at Spencer Street Oval.

From 2012 to 2014 Collison was the custodian for the majority of matches and he guarded his domain with skill, verve and enthusiasm. He saved a few penalties in his time. He was back in 2016 playing three times in the league with five appearances in the cup. In all, he played fifty-four league appearances with nine-cup outings. Collison was very adept in taking high or low balls, was brave and ventured off his line acutely when needed. He was commanding, confident and composed.

Two seasons with an attainment of nineteen games was Brodbeck's record. His debut was in the Round 11 Canberra Cosmos contest and his final appearance was in the Round 19 Sydney Olympic outing and three clean sheets were achieved in his two seasons.

TWO SELECTED REPRESENTATIVES OF BOTH CLUBS - ZAC MACKENZIE and LUKE KAIRIES.

Kairies was in goal for the Wolves on five league occasions with four-cup appearances and one in finals. Kairies saved a penalty shot attempt in the Round 5 GHFA Spirit game at J.J.Kelly Park in 2018. 'I got a bit lucky with that.' He played for Olympic in 2021.

McKenzie played for the Wolves for four seasons from 2013 to 2016 and was named Wolves; 'Player Of The Year' on three occasions. He tallied seventy-five league games with eleven in the domestic cup with a further two in the FFA Cup Of 32. From the Wolves he went to Bonnyrigg White Eagles in 2017 and in 2018 was first with APIA Leichhardt before landing on Sydney Olympics' books. He attained eighteen appearances with the club with three goals. After the Wolves v Olympic match in 2018, even thought his team won 4-0, he stated- 'It wasn't our best game to be honest, we could have been a bit better but we were clinical up front and took our chances.' In 2019 he made fifteen appearances and nine in 2020.

HIGH ENOUGH

Which club has played the most games against the Wollongong Wolves in competition games, both in league, cup and finals with a tally that was 'high enough' to finish ahead than any other team? The club in question is Sydney Olympic and there have been seventy-six league meetings and two finals appearance since 1981. In fact, Sydney Olympic was the Wolves' first opposition in competition.

The first meeting was played at the Wollongong Showground on 15th February 1981 with coaches Ken Morton and Tommy Docherty for the Wolves and Olympic respectively. The team line-ups were Wolves - Jim Preston (GK), John Fleming, Chris Dunleavy, Bill de Graaf, Tony Dickinson, Jim McBreen, Lee Adam, John Lathan, Peter Tredinnick, Brian Turner and Clive Campbell, Glen Fontana came on for Turner in the seventieth minute. Olympic - Garv Meier (GK), Danny Moulis, Greg Ankudinoff, Ken Wilson, Derek Laing, Jim Ziras, Peter Katholos, Hussein Husseini, Mark Koussas, Graham Jennings and David Cork, Mike Cross substituted for Cork on seventy-five minutes. With a 5930 crowd in attendance, the Wolves went to a lead in the twentieth minute. Midfielder McBreen scored after a free kick was deflected onto the post. The rebound fell to McBreen and the Showground crowd went wild. New Zealand striker Campbell, with a second half brace on fiftyfive and sixty-two minutes added to the tally. Olympic's Koussas got one back in the seventy-ninth minute and nearly had another through a header, though the bar denied his shot. If it wasn't the goal frame that thwarted, Preston made some good saves to deny both Koussas and Jennings during the proceedings. It was a great beginning for the Wolves. At the end of this season, Olympic finished in ninth position compared to the Wolves, two places lower.

The biggest score for each club was 5-0 for Olympic in Round 24 2003/04 and 4-0 for the Wolves in Round 20, 2010. The goal scorers in these matches were Tom Pondlejak, Andrew Packer, Franco Parisi with a brace and Greg Owens (SO), Mark Picciolini, Tynan Diaz, Shaun Van Rooyen and Samet Kaynak. (WW)

The finals match-up occurred in 2008 and 2015 with a win to both sides.

In 2008, the John Turner coached team consisted of Justin Pasfield (GK), Ben Blake (Capt.), Alfredo Estevez, Chris Price, Tynan Diaz, Matthew Bailey, Steve Hayes, Michael Hawrysiuk, Ballamodou Conde, Ilija Prenzoski and Mitchell Long. Samet Kaynak replaced Conde. Olympic, coached by Milan Blagojevic was Sam Emmamouil (GK) Nathan Sherlock, Emmanuel Zunino, Mirko Jurilj, Matt Jurman, Anthony Doumanis, Paul wither, Matthew Mayora, Milorad Simonovic, Siraj Al Tall and Chris Triantis. Emmanuel Giannaros and Mario Musemeci came on for Zunino and Doumanis

It was the Wolves and home team that took the lead in the

thirteenth minute. A Conde through pass found Prenzoski who made a determined run before powering the ball home. It took Olympic time to find their feet as Mayora. Simonovic and Sherlock each had opportunities but were spurned. In the second half Olympic dominated for long periods of time. It was in the seventy-first minute that Al Tall, the tall central defender converted a Mayora cross with a looping header. Diaz had cleared the ball off the line two minutes later. However, Mayora pounced on the stray ball and his subsequent powerful right-footed shot zoomed into the goal beating the despairing Pasfield. The Wolves however, restored parity seven minutes from fulltime. Following a Hawrysiuk cross. Bailey rose to nod the ball into the goal. With the minutes ticking by extra time loomed. Bailey, who copped whack straight away, headed a Hawrysiuk penetrating cross on. Prenzoski was on hand to project the winning goal on ninety minutes to achieve his brace. The Wolves by virtue of this victory were into the Grand Final Qualifying Semi-Final while Olympic moved on to the Preliminary Final. Turner - Great credit to the boys. Never say die.' Bailey - 'we were under the pump with two quick goals from Olympic. We needed one to lift our spirits. We finished the game off from there.' Prenzoski - 'we sort of dropped our heads after they went 2-1 up. We got on a bit of a roll and got another one then got the winner.'

In 2015 the line-ups were - Olympic, coached by Grant Lee - Paul Henderson, Brayden Sorge, Petar Markovic, (Capt.), Brendan Hooper, Yianni Spyradakis, Dimitri Hatzimouratis, Taiga Soeda, Michael Gaitatzis, Scott Balderson, Harris Gaitatzis. Go Shirai, Nick Tssatalios and Jason Madonis came on for M.Gaitatzis, Tssatalios and H.Gaitazis. - Wolves, coached by Jacob Timpano - Tom Manos (GK), Darcy Madden, James Baldacchino, James O'Rourke, Chris Price (Capt.), Zac Mackenzie, Sam Matthews, Brendan Griffin, Peter Simonoski, Jordan Murray Ben Zucco. Joseph Lavalle and Brett Wilson subbed on for Griffin and Zucco.

Early on as Olympic attacked O'Rourke interceded a H. Gaitazis cross and Manos saved a good Hatzimouratis projectile. Thirty-six minutes in Olympic struck. Hatzimouratis got on to the end of a M. Gaitatzis cross and slid with a defender in tow to slot the ball into the goal. The Wolves in the second half applied some pressure though Markovic and Henderson stood firm. With eight minutes left on the clock, Olympic added a second goal. H. Gaitatzis burst through the defence before letting go of a rocket attempt that zoomed home. This made sure of the victory.

Timpano -'It was always gong to be tough. What Olympic showed today is that they are a good side. .. I think our boys turned it around in the second half and probably had the better of them'. Manos -' It was a frustrating game. When they got their goal they sat off and allowed us to play. .. I stopped a few.'

The Wolves bowed and Olympic moved forward to face another hurdle.

Players who have turned out for both sides over the years include in alphabetical order, Nahuel Arrarte, Lissandro Berbis, George Bouhoutsos, Jacob Boutoubia, Ken Chun, Kevin Hagan, Troy Halpin, Brett Hughes, Mirko Jurilj, Luke Kairies, Derek Laing, Zac Mackenzie, Tallan Martin, Esala Masi, James Monie, Angelo Petratos, David Ratcliffe, Sebastian Sinozic, George Souris, Marshall Soper, Michael Turnbull and Joe Vrkic.

In a head to head record, Olympic has thirty-eight wins to the Wolves twenty-three with fifteen matches being drawn.

Seven was the highest number goals scored in a single match and it was a 5-2 score line that occurred twice. These results occurred in the 2003/04 and 2009 seasons.

The scorers were Zenon Caravella, Pablo Cardozo x2, Jim Nikas, George Goutzioulis (SO) Osagie Nwaogazi and John Majuroski (WW) in 2002/03 and in 2009, it was Tolgay Ozbey x2, Matthew Mayora x2, Adam Biddle (SO), Ilija Prenzoski and James Lawrence (WW).

'The number of matches between Wollongong Wolves and Sydney Olympic was 'high enough' that other clubs were not in the running, save for Sydney United and Marconi, which were the next in line. There will be many confrontations in the future, which will alter the information.

HIGH AND LOW

The number of scorers varies from season to season and these numbers have ranged from a low six to a high fifteen. The most common number was twelve, which occurred in ten of the Wolves' seasons. Sometimes in the years with a low number of scorers either the team has struggled to some extent or one or two players have scored the bulk. Sometimes the number of goals scored by a small number of players out does the larger number with the total number of goals hit, but this is the exception rather than the rule. However, in most instances, the smaller number of scorers has scored the lesser amount of goals.

In the history of the Wolves from 1981, the season of 2004/05 has the least amount of scorers, as gun striker Shane McGirr topped the count with eighteen goals. This was twelve ahead of the second placed scorer. As well as being the club top scorer he also won the Golden Boot and was lauded as the top marksman in the competition. A total of thirty-four goals were scored in that year and those who joined McGirr on the scorers' list were Michael Clare, Alvin Ceccoli, Adam Hughes, Paul Harries and Nick Stavroulakis.

Fifteen, on being the highest number of scorers, occurred on three occasions, in the 1988 and 1998/99 NSL seasons and the 2014 NPL NSW Mens 1 competition. In these seasons, striker Randall Easthorpe, midfielder Anthony Surjan and striker Jordan Murray, topped the count with nine, eight and seven goals respectively. However, the total number of goals in each of the three seasons ranged from forty-five to thirty-two.

In 1988, the additional scorers were Alan Brazil, Marshall Soper, Trevor Francis, Rade Stefanovski, David Skeen, Jeff Ainsworth, Robert Giraldi, Danny Crainie, Pat Brodnik, David Ratcliffe, Jock Morlando, Mike Hollifield, Brian Cokely and Peter Kotamanidis.

Joining Surjan in the 1998/99 season goal getters' list were Sasho Dimoski, Alvin Ceccoli, Kosta Salapasidis, Sasho Petrovski, Matt Horsley, Scott Chipperfield, Esala Masi, Paul Reid, Ray Younis, Michael Brooks, Steve Karavatakis, Gerard Quennet and Noel Spencer together with an own goal.

In 2014, Ricky Zucco, Samuel Jacob, Peter Simonoski, Matthew Bailey, Sam Matthews, Ben

Zucco, Jordan Murray, James Baldacchino, Joseph Lavalle, Michael Robinson, Chris Price, Mitchell Del Turco, Darcy Madden, Lachlan Reus and an own goal completed the list of scorers.

The average number of goals per game divided by the number of scorers' ratio is 2.93 in 1988, 3.0 in 1998/99 and 2.1 in 2014.

In the seasons with the high and low goal scoring, the number of single scorers generally complements the highest number of scorers. In 2004/05, the number of single scorers was one, whereby in the fifteen scorers years of 1988, 1998/99 and 2014, this number was six, five and nine.

By way of contrast, the number of scorers in the Championship winning years of 1999/2000, 200/01, 2008, were twelve, twelve and eleven with the number of single scorers being seven, four and five. Conversely, in the least successful years of 2002/03, and 2009 when the team's position was concluded in last place, the numbers for each were nine and ten scorers.

There were only eight scorers in the 2019 Premiership winning team with a total of fifty-two goals with Thomas James twenty two attaining with scorers being Jordan Nikolovski, Nick Littler, Nikola Djordjevic, Taylor McDonald Takeru Okada Darcy Madden and Lachlan Scott.

These are the seasons at the extremes with the 'high and low' numbers of scorers and a glance over the names listed include 'Wolves Legends', Scottish and English international players, Socceroos, a Fijian international, a French player, English and Scottish players and Wollongong local players, as well as interstate representatives.

A LOT

'A lot' of goals with some big scores have been generated by the Wollongong Wolves over the years such as 9-4, 8-0 and 7-0. However, the club in another three matches scored thirty-one goals, with the opposition teams being kept to nil returns. These results were 16-0, 11-0 and 10-0 with two occurring in the same competition, with one being attained in a domestic cup campaign. In one of these matches one striker scored seven goals, which is the highest tally in any one game in the Wolves' history, with another player scoring five in one of the others.

The result of 16-0 occurred against team Lotoha'pai FC in the Oceania Club Championship on the 9th January 2001 at Lloyd Robinson Stadium in Port Moresby New Guinea. At 1.30 in the afternoon the matched commenced and in the eighteenth minute, Sasho Petrovski got the ball rolling and before half time he had achieved six more goals. This was a tremendous accomplishment. Scott Chipperfield and Jay Lucas added a hat trick each, with a single goal to Paul Reid and Stuart Young. Goalkeeper Daniel Beltrame failed with a penalty attempt but scored in the follow-up when the ball rebounded to him

The second of these high scoring games resulted in a score of 11-0. It was played against the Coledale Waves at lan McLennan Park, Kembla Grange on 1st May 2019 at 7.30 p.m. Five goals were hit by Stefan Dimoski, a feat that was only bettered by two other Wolves' players with one


other equalling in cup games. Each of three players scored a brace with those being Jordan Nikolovski, Bul Juach and Tory Musumeci. Dimoski -'It was pretty good. We were pretty slick and the boys had a good one. Unfortunately you can't score them all'.
